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

Nick Williams was described as a shy young man when he arrived at Kurrajong Disability Solutions.

The description is vastly different in 2014 for Nick who is thriving on life in the workforce.

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Receiving much of the credit for the transition has been Kurrajong Disability Solutions (KDS).

KDS begins assisting families before the young person leaves school to ensure they have appropriate funding to meet their needs and offer an intense two-year program – including undertaking an accredited Becoming a Worker course and trialling work placements with a view to gaining a job.

Nick, who finished school in 2012, was part of the Transition To Work (TTW) Program which provides a pathway to the workforce.

After gaining his driver's licence, Nick secured employment with the Sportsmans Warehouse.

"Nick has developed a great work ethic and has become a dependable, reliable and independent young man," his mother Jenny said.

"We are very thankful for him being a part of the great program at Kurrajong Disability Solutions."

Nick has gained the confidence to join up at the gym by himself, organise his own appointments and has become very outgoing.

And he loves his job.

"I put away the deliveries on to the shelves and it's fun working with the other guys," he said.

"I like meeting up with the other participants in the Becoming a Worker course and I thank KDS for picking me up and dropping me home."

## *Report from the Chairman and Chief Executive Officer*

The past year has seen strong service performances across Kurrajong Waratah against our Vision.

We have not only continued to increase services to more people and supported more families/carers, but have strengthened our emphasis on person centred service delivery.

This person centred focus is enabling people in receipt of our support to become more familiar and comfortable with being able to make decisions and have choices.

It will be essential for people to have these skills under a National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) where choice and options are set to be the cornerstones of the scheme.

This transition for some is not without its challenges. If you have been in a system where essentially you have to take what's on offer from government programs then it may take time to develop the ability and skills to understand and make choices.

Under the NDIS people will be asked what they want and this will be used to develop a plan of what they need and determine what funding they will be given for their plan by the National Disability Insurance Agency (NDIA). The NDIA is the Commonwealth government agency who has responsibility for delivering the scheme.

The rollout of the NDIS commences across NSW sometime between 1st July 2016 and 30th June, 2018.

The NDIS, which Kurrajong Waratah and its members campaigned hard to make a reality, offers a once in a lifetime chance to get-it-right.

Despite some earlier "rumblings" with the implementation of the scheme and the readiness of the NDIA to deliver the scheme, the overall response we are hearing from colleagues in the trial sites after the first twelve months is that the previous unmet demand is now being addressed. The benefit of having a trial of the NDIS is that changes can be made as it progresses and is tested. Your Board and Management team over the past twelve months have continued to work through the organisation's 2013-2016 Strategic Plan to ensure that we will be 'NDIS ready' to integrate our services and operations into the new funding and operating environment when it commences in this area of the Riverina and Murray regions.

We remain confident of successfully transitioning to the new scheme. The NDIS will present opportunities for Kurrajong Waratah to deliver more of what we are good at. It will also provide the opportunity and capacity to develop truly innovative flexible services for people with a disability to lead a life of their choice.

Kurrajong Waratah has always strived to be a market leader with its services and supports. This is evident by our successes in the NSW Disability Innovation Awards. These awards commenced in 2012 to showcase excellence and innovation in the NSW Disability Industry.

Kurrajong Waratah has been a finalist in all three years the awards have been operating which is no small achievement. Last year we won the award for "Excellence in Regional Service Innovation".

Being selected as a state wide finalist is a credit to our staff and volunteers who give so much of themselves to our services. However, we have not, and will not rest on our laurels.

There is so much more that needs to be done.

Our merger with Yallambee Deniliquin Inc. is now complete. The vital services to people with a disability and their families in the Deniliquin, Jerilderie, Finley and Berrigan areas are now being strengthened.

Kurrajong Waratah works in partnership with a number of State and Federal Government Departments and Councils. We also work closely with other service providers and organisations to provide choice and opportunity for people with a disability and their families. We are very appreciative of these collaborative working relationships.

### Kurrajong Waratah provides person centred services

Person centred means putting the person with a disability and their family/carer at the centre of the decisions we make.

Finally, a sincere thank you to all fellow Board Directors and the management team, staff and volunteers of Kurrajong Waratah for their ongoing commitment to improving our service practices and engaging in and contributing to another successful year.

In the coming year we will continue to prepare for the NDIS and strive to deliver services of the highest person centred standard possible to make a positive difference to the lives of people with a disability and their parent/ carers who we support and assist.

### What is the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS)?

The National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) is a national scheme designed to improve disability services in Australia.

The scheme will provide people with a disability, their families and carers more choice and control in their decision making.

Rather than funding going directly to service providers such as Kurrajong Waratah, funding will be allocated for support and assistance for a person with a disability to meet their 'fair and reasonable' needs.

There will be no funding available for equipment or capital projects under the NDIS.

### What is the National Disability Insurance Agency (NDIA)?

The National Disability Insurance Agency (NDIA) has been appointed to oversee the implementation of the NDIS.

Staff from the NDIA will work to provide people with a disability and their families or carers, information on how the scheme will work and what resources are available to them.

The NDIA staff will also work with individuals to:

- discuss individual goals and support needs
- develop an individual plan to assist with achieving goals
- consider the supports needed to strengthen family and informal caring arrangements
- connect people to mainstream services and community supports.

## Treasurer's Report



PETER PERKINS Treasurer and Life Member

Once again I have pleasure in presenting the Treasurer's Report and the Financial Statements for the year 1 July 2013 to 30 June 2014 and which indicate a satisfactory result.

Turnover for the year of \$21.7m is an increase of 4.7% on that of the previous year. Total funding from the State and Commonwealth Governments was \$13.9m which is an increase of 9.5% on that of the previous year and also now represents 64% of our total income. Total funding from government in the previous year represented 61% of total income.

Our own supported employment businesses have contributed almost \$6m which represents 27% of the total income a decrease of about 1% on the previous year. The current economic climate has provided challenges for our supported employment businesses which are most important in providing employment for over one hundred and fifty two people with disability. Waratah Industries has had to contend with a difficult housing market which obviously affects the demand and price for timber, while fluctuating prices for recycled products and a slower than expected growth in E-recycling has affected Kurrajong Recyclers. Both Commonwealth and State Governments must be more supportive of the recycling of televisions, computers and other electronic products to ensure that their national and state recycling initiatives are viable for not for profit organisations. Fundraising contributed 3% of total income while fees and other income contributed 6%

Wages, salaries and associated employee payments totalling \$13.4m and representing 63% of the organisation's total expenditure indicate that the majority of the organisation's expenditure is on the provision of direct services to our clients. Capital expenditure this financial year of \$1.4m represents expenditure on buildings, plant and equipment and vehicles. The surplus of \$396k is consistent with the Board's budget expectations and was actually favourable to budget by \$18.5k. Managers and staff of all our supported employment businesses, accommodation and community services are to be commended for their initiative, dedication and effort in achieving this favourable financial result, despite a demanding and at times financially challenging year for some of our service areas.

Liquidity, cash and working capital are keys to the survival and growth of any company. Kurrajong Waratah's Balance Sheet indicates that the organisation has further consolidated our sound financial base which has been established by past and continuing prudent financial management.

Total assets of \$34.5m and total liabilities of \$10.5m have resulted in net assets of almost \$24m. This year has seen the organisation's cash and cash equivalents increase by \$1.7m. The organisation's working liquidity, which is one of the measures of Kurrajong Waratah's overall financial health, is very good with unrestricted current assets being 4.5 times greater than unrestricted current liabilities.

The financial position of the organisation gives your Board confidence of meeting the challenges and of ongoing success in the coming National Disability Insurance Scheme environment.

Thank you to the CEO, Deputy CEO and my fellow Directors for their support and for the role they undertake in monitoring and maintaining the financial stability of the organisation. My special thanks go to Mrs Sharyn Atherton, Finance and Administration Manager, for her co-operation, dedication and efficiency.





# Our family's *journey*

Five years ago our family started our Kurrajong Early Childhood Intervention Service (KEIS) journey.

Our son Braxton - then two years old - had a severe speech delay, gross and fine motor delay.

To be perfectly honest, the world as we knew it had been turned upside down. We were thrown into a world that was unpredictable and out of our control. We had never heard of KEIS until our paediatrician mentioned it.

From the very first day at KEIS we have felt welcome, appreciated and supported. Braxton remained at KEIS for three years until leaving to go to school.

In those three years he genuinely loved going to KEIS. He attended regular speech therapy, OT sessions, physio sessions and group.

His therapists over the years have shown great understanding to his needs and have also been so supportive of our needs as a family.

Three years ago, our youngest son, Harris, began his KEIS journey. Obviously we were familiar with the surroundings at KEIS and the therapists but – more importantly – Harris was familiar, so he was actually keen to be going regularly.

Harris began at KEIS with speech therapy, OT sessions, physio sessions and group. His improvements have been amazing and he is currently attending speech sessions and transition to school group.

KEIS really have been there to support our whole family over the past few years. 

# *Technology* leads the way in communication

Louise Geaghan proudly places her iPad on her desk and enjoys the sensory touch of working with the device each day.

She really enjoys listening to music or watching interesting videos while she goes about her daily activities.

But the device is not just being used for activities.

Louise's parents and Skills Options Lifestyle Service staff communicate with each other through the iPad.

Staff record the day's activities on the iPad to let Louise's parents know what she has done throughout the day.

Louise's daily roster is also on the iPad which she brings to her morning meeting.

Each day Skills Options commences with everyone getting together to discuss what each person has planned. Many others at Skills Options have iPads too and all have different uses for them.

Developing communication through the iPad is part of a goal of Skills Options Lifestyle Service.

Staff are determined to make this work as more people are coming to the Lifestyle Program with an iPad or tablet device.

A significant point is that staff and families are communicating with each other in a meaningful way.

Families are also able to see photographs and videos taken during activities.

It's another great way of finding out about what the service offers and for people to be able to communicate their wants, needs and choices clearly.

Some people prefer a manual diary – it's their choice.

# *Best option* is flexible, responsive and reassuring

Carol and Chris Harmer found choosing a post-school option for their daughter a daunting prospect.

That was until they discovered Skills Options Lifestyle Service.

Knowing Emily would be in a safe environment at Skills was very important for her parents after 13 years in the protective surroundings of a school.

"We really needed to find the right service for Emily after being at school for so long." Carol said.

"It was a huge thing for us ... we were so worried.

"Emily is non verbal and we wanted to make sure she <image>

would be happy because she can't tell us what she likes or needs."

The Harmers checked out several lifestyle services but decided on Kurrajong Waratah because of the positive response they received.

"Kurrajong Waratah and Skills Options staff went above and beyond to help us," Carol said.

"They really listened to us and were committed to meeting Emily's individual needs.

"A fence and gate were erected at Chauncy Cottage to ensure a safe area and environment for Emily.

"We really appreciated this and found it incredibly reassuring – other services were not prepared to help us in this regard."

Carol described Skills Options as a 'home away from home'.

"We think it is such a friendly, warm, comfortable and responsive place," she said.

"The staff are also incredibly flexible.

"We also love that there are small groups at each of Skills Options four Wagga locations – not one large group, and we are pleased that they put the person first and consider their needs first.

"As parents it's important we know that Emily is happy and relaxed too, we love the fact she is out in the community doing the things she loves like bowling. She has just discovered bike riding and loves it.

"She is included in everything."

# Organisational Overview



RAY CARROLL Deputy Chief Executive Officer

Preparation and planning has continued this past year within the organisation as we move closer to the introduction of the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) on 1 July 2016.

It has been a challenging year as we prepare for the major changes the introduction of the NDIS will bring while at the same time being mindful of the need to continue to effectively and efficiently operate the diverse range of services we provide to over 1300 people with disabilities and families.

During the year there were many outstanding achievements and highlights across all sections of the organisation.

Our Business Services in Wagga Wagga, Narrandera, Leeton and West Wyalong had mixed financial results this year but continued to provide employment and training opportunities to around 152 supported employees with a disability.

### WARATAH INDUSTRIES

Waratah Industries had a good year gaining new business making wooden tent tensioners and stair raisers plus increased business from the local sawmills and supplying survey pegs to new customers. Safety in the workplace has again been a priority with the introduction of a risk management inspection score system. One employee gained accreditation as a B grade wood machinist and another employee has commenced training in this competency.

### Waratah Industries

- Processed 956,722 lineal metres of timber during the year - this would cover the distance around Australia 64 times.
- Increased product range to include tent tensioners, stair raisers in addition to their core products of survey pegs, bearers, flooring, decking and precision docked material for the retail market.

### KURRAJONG RECYCLERS

Kurrajong Recyclers results, although processing almost 16,000 tonnes of material, are down on previous years. This has been mainly due to lower sales prices for our products coupled with the E-recycling business not producing the results to date that we had anticipated due to some unforeseen issues within the National Product Stewardship Scheme that underpins E-recycling in Australia. We are very hopeful that these issues will be sorted out in the near future to enable the recycling of electronic goods to be a viable, ongoing business which we are confident it can be. The construction of the Recycled Glass Crushing facility is completed and we are on track to commence crushing the glass into a sand and gravel substitute that will be sold to councils, landscapers and developers. The reprocessing of glass into this product will substantially reduce glass waste from our recycling process.

### Out by the truckload

Kurrajong Recyclers processed 15873.95 tonnes of recyclable material during the year. That equates to 453 B-double truck loads and 5 B-double truck loads of E-recycling.

### KURRAJONG BUSINESS SERVICES

Internal Maintenance continued its valuable assistance across the organisation by providing gardening and maintenance services to 35 properties either owned or rented by the organisation, managing a fleet of almost 100 vehicles and providing the school bus run to Willans Hill School and for our supported employees who work in our Business Services.

In a tough competitive environment Culinary Capers staff and supported employees continued to provide quality fresh chicken to many local businesses while providing catering services to customers both external and internal. This business is continually challenged by other retail food businesses that provide a catering service in addition to their core business of food retail.

### OUTREACH BUSINESS SERVICES

Our outreach services which comprise Cypress Recycling. Narrandera Laundry and Linen Service, Leeton Ironing Basket, SPINS Recycling and Café Peckish in West Wyalong again worked very hard also in an extremely competitive market. To improve its financial results, a decision was made during the year to close the Leeton Ironing Basket for two days a week and the Leeton staff and supported employees work from the Narrandera premises helping out in the laundry. This has worked very well. We have acquired new customers in the laundry and linen service in West Wyalong and investigations are continuing into the viability of picking up more laundry and linen work from Griffith. During the year Café Peckish introduced a weekly lunch delivery service which is going quite well.

### Busy year for Outreach Team:

- Narrandera Laundry and Linen Service processed
   150,647 kg of linen last year and ironed 1,040 baskets for domestic customers.
- Leeton Ironing Basket ironed 1,820 baskets last year for domestic customers.
- Café Peckish West Wyalong served 3309 coffees and 8744 meals last year.

### KURRAJONG DISABILITY SOLUTIONS

Kurrajong Disability Solutions (KDS) has had a good year adapting to a more person centred delivery in all programs. They have continued to be very proactive in promoting the organisation to prospective clients through information days, expos and site visits. During the year KDS were able to achieve 60 placements for school students and 51 placements for Transition to Work (TTW) participants within our various business services and with employers in the community.

# This year Kurrajong Disability Solutions:

- Co-ordinated opportunities for 60 school students to experience the businesses Kurrajong Waratah own and operate and
  - 51 Transition to Work (TTW) participants gained experience in community businesses and Kurrajong Waratah's businesses.

### LIFESTYLE SERVICES

Our Lifestyle Services in Leeton, Wagga Wagga and West Wyalong have had another extremely busy year providing services to 75 people with a disability across six separate locations. The work that our staff do in providing a variety of options to our clients is tremendous especially when the staff are working with people with complex needs and in some cases challenging behaviours.

### Every week in our Lifestyle Programs in Wagga Wagga, Leeton and West Wyalong

- 1,550 hours of lifestyle support was provided (or 80,600 hours each year) and enabled
- 77 adults to be involved in their community and enjoy a range of activities and programs they chose

### ACCOMMODATION SERVICES

Our adult and children's accommodation services in Leeton, Wagga Wagga and West Wyalong, our respite and Community Living Service in Wagga Wagga plus our Independent Living Skills Initiative (ILSI) services in Narrandera and Temora have collectively provided services to 125 people with a disability and their families.

In line with our asset management program some of our accommodation buildings have undergone various levels of renovations during the year which has improved the appearance of these buildings greatly.

As part of the impending NDIS implementation, accommodation services have developed a new Person Centred Plan process which aligns more closely to the organisation's vision for people with a disability to lead a life of their choice.

# Accommodation Services provided:

- 127,426 hours accommodation support during the year or 4,901 hours per fortnight to
- 125 adults and children ranging in age from 10 to 63 across 40 locations including group homes, units and other premises in West Wyalong, Temora, Wagga, Narrandera and Leeton.
- 154 people were supported to attend medical appointments and treatments in one group home alone during the year.

# EARLY CHILDHOOD INTERVENTION SERVICES

Our Early Childhood Intervention Services in Cootamundra, Griffith, Tumut and Wagga Wagga has again exceeded all expectations in terms of service delivery. During the year taking into account the annual transition to school for children and the arrival of new children into the service, a total of 478 children received early childhood intervention services. This is a huge achievement and our staff have done a terrific job handling such large caseloads. This year we have delivered speech pathology under our school age therapy program for the first time and this has proved to be an outstanding success. We have now extended our school aged therapy program to include occupational therapy and physiotherapy.

### Our Early Childhood Intervention Service:

- 7200 individual therapy support sessions were provided this year
- 478 children and their families received support across 15 local government areas
- 350 group sessions were conducted offering programs and supports to hundreds of children and their families

### PEOPLE FOR PEOPLE

The People for People (P4P) staff development and capacity building program had an excellent year with 33 trainers from 13 different non-government disability organisations participating in the Train the Trainer course which now allows them to conduct the various staff training and development programs and courses in their own organisation.

P4P facilitated the National Disability Services (NDS) Communities in Practice to support the sharing and networking of services in the implementation of person centred approaches and preparing for the NDIS. Meetings commenced across the Western Region of NSW with 20 organisations participating. In addition to this the P4P program was launched in the Nepean Blue Mountains District of Sydney and a lead agency was trained and appointed to continue the program in that area.

During the year a new project commenced called Behaviour Support Implementer (Respite) (BSIR). This project was established to support centre based respite services that support people with challenging and complex behaviours. Working collaboratively with these respite services has allowed for positive behaviour improvements for people with a disability therefore allowing them to access respite services on a more regular basis.

### INTERLINK

Our InterLink older parent/carer support service has been operating for seven years and during that time has provided support to 440 families in the Riverina Murray region of NSW. The service operates from offices in Albury, Griffith and Wagga Wagga and has continued to provide flexible and responsive support to many older carers still with the responsibility of caring for their son/daughter with a disability at home. InterLink connects them to the services they need now and helps them plan for the future.

### About InterLink:

- The oldest carer we support is 97 years of age still caring at home
- Average age of carers is 71.8 years old
- 33 families are caring for more than one person

### QUALITY ASSURANCE

Our commitment to quality assurance has again remained very strong. Apart from the annual external financial audit each year, Kurrajong Waratah is required to undergo annual external audits in relation to compliance with the Commonwealth Government's Disability Service Standards and the requirements in relation to our ISO 14001:2004 Environmental Management Systems accreditation. These external audits were again conducted this year and I am pleased to advise that the results of those audits revealed no non-conformities and our accreditation was confirmed.

In the relatively short time it has been operating it has opened new doors and provided opportunities and choice to members of the Temora community who are eligible to receive Kurrajong Waratah support. Matthew Simpson has ventured into previously untried areas and is pictured with Kristy Reardon on his latest woodwork project. He enjoys cooking and is becoming quite confident in the kitchen.

# FINANCE, ADMINISTRATION & DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

Our Finance, Administration and Development Services departments continue to provide a highly responsive and effective service to support and assist the service arms of the organisation. The administrative, promotional and fundraising requirements of the organisation are quite extensive and we are extremely fortunate to have great staff to handle all these requirements in such a professional and efficient manner on a day to day basis.

### THE FUTURE OF NATIONAL DISABILITY INSURANCE SCHEME (NDIS)

As we approach the introduction of the NDIS in July 2016, work has and will continue to be done to ensure we have the right Administration and Development Services staffing structure in place to respond. We know that funding will not be available for capital expenditure and equipment purchases under a NDIS and we will still need to work closely with the community to ensure we have the resources we need to provide facilities and equipment as we deliver our high quality services for people with a disability and their families. We are also currently working to ensure we have the most appropriate computer hardware and software to enable us to quickly and accurately record the required information in an NDIS environment.

We really do have committed and dedicated staff right across the organisation who have the interests of the people with a disability that we support at the forefront of their thinking. Our staff's continued efforts in so many diverse roles in the organisation is acknowledged and greatly appreciated – thank you.

Finally, I would like to thank our CEO, Steve Jaques for his continued advice and support during the year and the Managers for their hard work in their roles which can at times be very challenging but also very rewarding for themselves and the people with a disability and the families/carers that we support.

# Support paves the way for new skills

It's hard to believe the transition in lanto Williams' life in the space of just two years.

Ianto found himself socially isolated in 2012 after he was forced to stop working at Cootamundra due to health issues.

Fast forward to 2014 and lanto is entering his art and cooking in shows, playing indoor bowls on Thursday evenings and looking forward to attending the springtime dance in Wagga.

lanto cannot emphasise enough the importance of Kurrajong Waratah in his development.

"My mum (Teresa) is very happy I have Kurrajong Waratah in my life too," Ianto said.

"She says it has helped me regain my independence, and I have learned new skills and met new friends."

lanto reached a turning point in May 2013 when he was asked by Kurrajong Waratah Temora to attend the Wednesday group sessions despite not having funding.

"I looked forward to Wednesdays, meeting up with friends and learning new things with support from Kurrajong Waratah staff," he said.

Twelve months later lanto received an Individual Support Package, enabling him to spend 17 hours a week at Kurrajong Waratah.

"I now attend four days a week and go to indoor bowls with my friends on Thursdays," he said.

"The staff have taught me lots of new skills and I enter my paintings in art shows.

"I also like cooking because I love food and last year I entered a decorated cake in the Temora Show and won second place.

"Mum thinks I should have won first place. Thanks Mum."

lanto is now looking to take his social life a step further.

"I have a big goal to go to the springtime dance in Wagga, so I have to look after my health if I want to attend this," he said.

"I might even find a girlfriend at the dance."



### Our Lifestyle Service:

- revolves around people making individual choice – we encourage and support people to make choice
- is designed for young people and people who are young at heart
- encourages and supports people to develop and maintain an active and healthy lifestyle
- equips people with the knowledge and skills to work towards their individual goals
- is wonderful for people who are unable to or choose not to work in supported employment businesses
- includes opportunities for art, drama for fun, performing art, choir, dance and music

- also includes craft, woodwork, wire sculpture, living skills, iPad training, shopping for and cooking lunch, in house gym and well-being, nail/beauty, scrapbooking and photography
- people we support may choose to volunteer in community businesses or organisations, such as Bunning's or Wagga Wagga Museum – often these choices enables a Skills Lifestyle volunteer to work alongside the person we support
- also offers the opportunity for the people we support to engage in cleaning up areas around Wagga enabling people to take pride in their community

# *Skills Options* provide lifestyles of choice

Wendy Foxwell does not have to think too far back to recall a time her daughter Ellaine had a fear of leaving home and being away from her mother.

It was in 2012 when Ellaine was introduced to Skills Options Lifestyle Services and her life changed forever.

Wendy explained that she would never have imagined that Ellaine would feel confident enough to attend the service more than two days a week.

But the staff helped Ellaine to conquer her fears and she now attends Skills Fitzmaurice four times weekly.

Wendy believes there has been a huge step forward in Ellaine's life because of the patience and understanding shown by Skills Lifestyle Service staff.

"I can't believe the wonderful progress that has been made," she said.

"It has been amazing. I really feel this is because staff are aware of Ellaine's body language.

"Ellaine would always say yes to everything, but really mean no.

"Staff have been able to work this out and now know when Ellaine doesn't want to do something even though she has said yes to taking part in an activity.

"I believe that this has made her feel more comfortable in her environment and that she now feels she has more control over her life.

"Never in my wildest dreams did I think that Ellaine would attend a day service more than two days a week."

During her last years of schooling, Ellaine was home schooled through Distance Education because of her fear of leaving home.

"When Ellaine used to go to school, it was heartbreaking because she couldn't cope with leaving home and being away from me. She used to get so upset," Wendy said.

But now it is a different story for Ellaine, who looks forward to going to her lifestyle service each day.

"I no longer have to encourage her to go to Skills or leave home. Ellaine talks about what she has been doing there, which is just wonderful," Wendy said.

"I believe that farm activities and group outings have helped Ellaine to become more confident and to interact socially. She has also gained independence.

"Since attending Skills Lifestyle Service, Ellaine has reached goals far quicker than I expected.

"I am just so grateful and happy that Ellaine is achieving things and she is enjoying her life. It's a huge relief for me."

# **Our Community – People's Future** Development Services Report

# Our Staff

Kurrajong Waratah is a significant employer in the Riverina Murray region and continues to be staffed by a team committed to providing person centred services.

The successful recruitment and retention of our staff is vital to our continuing success.

Across the entire organisation, our staff are focused on the people we support and value excellent service, innovation and continuous improvement.

Our staff possess a wide range of skills, qualifications and experience and come from a diverse range of backgrounds. We currently employ 221 full time and part time staff working across the Riverina Murray region. An additional 99 casuals assist when required.

Of the total staff of 320, 70% are female and 30% are male.

89% of all Kurrajong Waratah staff work directly with the people we support and their families through our programs. The remaining 11% are employed in administrative and support roles.

10.86% of Kurrajong Waratah's permanent staff have been employed more than 15 years and 23.53% for over ten years.

## *Career change* brings Brad satisfaction

Brad Collins packs plenty into his spare time – he keeps fit by going to the gym, enjoys taking his pets for walks and hangs out with his family and friends at every chance.

At the other end of the scale, the 22-year-old also works hard as he builds a career in the disability services sector.

Brad is a team leader with Kurrajong Waratah's accommodation services and is responsible for the day-to-day operation, staff rostering and supervision for a number of group homes for adults with a disability.

It's a far cry from his days working as a butcher.

"I was after a job that was a different experience for me and something that would make me look at the world differently and challenge me," Brad said.

"It just so happened that through a friend of a friend I was told there were positions vacant as a support worker, so I decided to apply and have not looked back since."

With the support of his loved ones, Brad initially took on a role that involved personal care for people with a disability.

"I often heard the phrase 'I don't know how you do it, I wouldn't be able to handle that', but all in all it was a positive response by my family and friends."

Brad now finds himself in a totally different position.

"My team leader at the time had asked me to fill in for them while they were on holidays," he explained.

"In the two weeks I was filling in I found it very enjoyable and when the vacant team leader position came up I was encouraged to apply.

"I've found my current role very enjoyable and at times challenging, however I'm learning every day and always look forward to coming to work." Brad has learnt tons about himself in addition to gaining skills in his two-and-a-half year involvement with Kurrajong Waratah.

"For me I think the biggest challenge was learning empathy, or seeing things through the eyes of the person I support," he said.

"I found it very difficult, at first, to hone in on my empathy skills and honestly from when I started compared to now I'm a completely different person.

"I've learned a lot about myself through working within the organisation."

His ultimate goal is to complete a certificate in Disability or Business Management.

"However, I would like to settle into my role as team leader first as I still have much to learn," he said.

#### Brad says:

The three best parts about being involved with Kurrajong Waratah, according to Brad Collins:

- 1 The people both staff and the people we support. Such a diverse range of personalities and they all bond together to form a fun, friendly working environment.
- 2 The training and employment opportunities. The organisation offers a lot of training in all sorts of different aspects and with the expanding growth of the business there are countless different areas for employment for people with different ages, qualifications and experience.
- 3 The services delivered to the people we support is above and beyond what I expected when I first started. Staff are very person centred and deliver quality services and supports.



#### the last word:

The four most memorable times with being involved with Kurrajong Waratah, accoding to Noelene Hogan were:.

- **1** The day we moved from the hostel; people with a disability having choices; living in a regular house and street; having privacy and not being grouped together.
- People with a disability having better medical care a turning point in the quality of services.
- Being part of the team to provide outreach service to people with a disability including West Wyalong, the Olearia Accommodation development – enabling people with a disability to enjoy a lovely rural setting.
- 4 It was wonderful to be part of the management team. Ray and Steve had an open door policy which was very reassuring . I knew support was there if I needed it.

# Noelene reflects on her *20 years* of service

It's never an easy decision to change career paths.

But for Noelene Hogan, making the tough call took her down the road to success in a role she feels privileged to have fulfilled.

After starting her working days as a hairdresser, Noelene made the move to Kurrajong Waratah and provided 20 years of dedicated service as accommodation manager.

"My personal life had major changes and I wanted to be more involved in the community ... I was hoping to make a difference in people's lives," she explained.

Noelene had a friend on the board of Valmar Support Services at Tumut who introduced her to Valmar and she worked there for a time.

She later applied for a position with Kurrajong Waratah - and the rest is history.

Now living in retirement, Noelene can reflect on a wonderful association with an organisation which underwent many changes during the decades she was involved.

"When I first started I was a co-ordinator and was responsible for the hostel and three group homes ... we had long, hard days," Noelene said.

"Back then people with a disability went to bowling on Saturday and the doctor came to the hostel and the groceries were ordered by fax.

"There were not many cars and the hostel had a bus. There was limited privacy for the residents and the hostel kitchen was locked during the day.

"Staff worked hard to be very creative to meet the needs of the people with a disability and were responsible for everything – gardening, mowing, weeding and many other incidentals."

The scenario is much different in 2014.

"When I left the organisation earlier this year people with a disability had a very different life to my earlier days. They were now encouraged and supported to make choices about how they lead their life". Noelene said.

"Kurrajong Waratah provided the opportunity for me to extend myself and I was successfully appointed to the position of accommodation manager along with Lyndal and Cannon – a great team – and we ran our own budgets and were responsible for all the overall running of our service.

Life is now far more positive for staff and more importantly for people with a disability, according to Noelene.

"We have been able to be part of educating the community about people with a disability," she said.

"Today disability services provide staff with sound career opportunities where they can undertake formal studies and progress as they develop knowledge and experience.

"The medical field has given us the time, the service and the attention to assist people with a disability and ongoing services as needed.

"We have been able to support people with a disability to have fun, integrate and – more than that – participate.

"People with a disability are people first and foremost – and they want to have choice, like us."

## Our Employees

Kurrajong Waratah provides a broad range of supported employment opportunities for the people with a disability we support.

We offer employees the chance to move within the businesses Kurrajong Waratah owns and operates throughout the Riverina Murray region.

His first job was to pack newspapers after the paper drives before becoming Mrs Hurd's right-hand man for screen printing.

## With *great support*, Travis means business

Travis has learnt the value of support in the workplace.

He joined the Kurrajong Waratah team when he first left school but decided he would like to try working for a business in the community.

With Kurrajong Waratah being person centred in their supports and programs, Travis received assistance in seeking other areas of employment.

But he found the support and training he had received at Kurrajong Waratah was lacking.

Travis made the decision to work for Kurrajong Waratah again and has been part of the Internal Maintenance team since 2011.

On first impressions, Travis would be described as shy or reserved.

However, once he relaxes and you get to know him Travis has a wonderful, spirited and friendly personality. His fellow workers enjoy being around him.

Kurrajong Waratah staff helped Travis gain his driver's licence – his Green Ps – which enables him to drive the work vehicles.

Travis knows this is important to the Internal Maintenance team.

Maintenance co-ordinator Steve Chapple would really like to see Travis gain his full licence but confidence is lacking at the moment.

"Travis learns quickly, is keen to take on new tasks and is an asset to the team," Steve said.

"He is dependable and trustworthy ... we all like working with Travis".

Travis uses the ride-on mower and

associated equipment, carries out grounds maintenance and pruning, and assists with vehicle and general building maintenance.

He has the respect of the entire team and other sections across the organisation.

Travis is very family focused and always includes them in the annual Christmas get-together which Kurrajong Waratah holds for staff, employees, clients and their families at the Murrumbidgee Turf Club.

He has also developed a friendship with fellow worker Nat Klein which extends outside work hours.

Travis said he enjoys working in his current job and is keen to remain there. He likes working as part of a team, his role and the way management and staff support everyone.

"I know what I do is important to everyone," Travis said

Initially finding it difficult to think of a funny work story, he soon recalled the time when he bogged the small truck at the Wagga Wagga City Council Waste Management Centre.

While shocked at first, Travis was able to laugh at himself and then set about finding a solution.

**Leanne Hooper** spends her volunteer time socialising with Carmel who enjoys Leanne painting her nails.


**Kaitie Thompson** is a great all-rounder when she volunteers in activities and programs in Leeton.

Paul has a real zest for life and was willing to learn new skills.

Through his choice of the level of B Grade Machinist, Paul can operate and set all the machines currently used at Waratah Industries and is justifiably proud of his achievements.
