A *special moment* in Bertie's life

Bertie is a three year old little boy with severe physical and mental impairments that provide him with ongoing daily challenges. He is unable to sit, stand, walk, eat or drink unassisted. He is also cortically blind and non verbal. One of our biggest goals for Bertie is to



On this particular day, Bertie's physio wanted to try applying some kinesio tape to his pecs and shoulders and also down his forearms to see whether we could activate some of his muscles. The results were simply AMAZING!!! For the first time ever. Bertie lifted his arm

enable him the means to communicate in more ways than just crying and smiling.

Bertie is very blessed to have incredibly caring and devoted therapists who are dedicated to helping Bertie achieve these goals.

It has been a long road to get to this point and a lot of different interventions have to be perfectly aligned to allow Bertie the best possible opportunity of success. For a long time now we have been working on getting Bertie to purposefully hit a button (switch) with his hand that is connected to a singing/ dancing toy on an iPad app. This is teaching him to understand cause and effect. A lot of the time we feel we are playing a bit of a guessing game as Bertie has quite limited control over his gross motor so it is hard to determine whether his movements are purposeful or involuntary muscle spasms. up over his ear and with some degree of control attempted to hit the button. It was clear to see that he was trying his hardest to activate the switch! With some repositioning of the button to best suit the motion Bertie was making with his arm and hand he had success!!! Several times!!! This tape gave Bertie control over his muscles that he has never had before!!! And what this meant was that we could see that he actually was making some purposeful movements with his arm. This session unlocked whole new meaning and insight into what might be going on in Bertie's brain!!!

There were tears, cheers and a sense of overwhelming relief and also disbelief. This was an incredible milestone in his development or maybe it was in ours as we are now much more in tune with our little boy!

Report from the Chairman and Chief Executive Officer

The key focus of the Board and management over the past year has been in preparing Kurrajong Waratah to be ready to respond to the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS). We now have a recent announcement that for the Riverina Murray regions, where Kurrajong Waratah operates, this will occur from 1 July, 2017.

Whilst this timeframe will be disappointing to many who were hoping for an earlier rollout, the extra time has advantages for Kurrajong Waratah. It will enable us to continue our preparations to position our current services for their transition into the new NDIS scheme. It will also provide more certainty for families and people with a disability as the services and operations available to them under the NDIS continue to be developed and refined. Many of the scheme's 'unknowns' will be 'known' to us by 2017.

The Kurrajong Waratah Strategic Plan 2013-2016 has continued to be the driving force in our efforts and investments in readiness for the scheme. It is a workable strategic plan that is both realistic and bold. It ensures that we are prepared to respond to the future with conviction and in a positive, timely manner. All four key strategies and actions in this plan have all but been completed. Board members and our management team are to be congratulated for remaining on target whilst balancing many other pressures and priorities. A new strategic plan for 2016-2018 will be developed early in the New Year. This new plan will take us into the NDIS scheme.

As funding for services and care becomes more contestable in the future, Kurrajong Waratah will need new ways of working to be viable in a more competitive consumer driven market. We will need to remain strategic for opportunities to respond to the likely increased demand for our services.

This year there were reviews and changes made to our organisational structure and services and these are being managed within the framework of our strategic plan. As part of this process your Board of Directors engaged external Consultants to review the current skill set required by disability service Boards and advise on what Board skills and attributes will be required by Kurrajong Waratah for the governance of the organisation in the future under the NDIS.

As a Board, we are excited about the future but recognise changes will need to occur. Steps to bring additional skills and resources onto the Board are occurring through inviting observers to Board meetings and from the appointment of casual Directors.

With our key focus placed on preparing for the NDIS, rest assured that our commitment to the quality and development of our current services and facilities did not diminish. We remained steadfast in continuing to put clients and their families' at the forefront of what we did and will continue to do.

A needs analysis underway in the Temora Shire and supported by Temora Council, will better inform us of the types and scale of services that are required by people with a disability and their families living in the Shire. Similar needs analyses will be occurring in other Shires including Narrandera and Deniliquin in the near future.

Capital investment decisions have also been made during the reporting period to ensure adequate facilities are available from which to deliver our services. Alterations and additions to our Kurrajong Early Childhood Intervention centre in Wagga Wagga and the development in Narrandera of four, two bedroom units on land in the main street area are underway. This long awaited supported accommodation project in Narrandera will provide people with a disability the opportunity to develop independent living skills prior to moving into their own accommodation choice.

Planning to construct the first building at our Hildasid Community Farm in Wagga Wagga is also underway. The construction of the first building in 2016 will enable our current Skills Options Lifestyle Services to be relocated from our Lord Baden Powell Drive, Wagga Wagga - head office site. Apart from providing better facilities and opportunities for people with a disability,

this move to Hildasid will also enable our administration and support services at the head office site to be consolidated.


In Deniliquin, the purchase of a building in the main CBD area to provide alternative service options is also currently being investigated. We hope to purchase an appropriate property in the near future to expand our Skills Options Lifestyle Services' options operating in the Shire.

Plans are also underway to enhance Kurrajong Waratah's service presence in Albury and Griffith as part of our service initiatives over the next 12-18 months.

Underpinning our current service delivery and our plans for the future is an effective and mature system to ensure that quality services are delivered across all our sites. In July our external quality assurance auditors reviewed Kurrajong Waratah's services and we have now fully transitioned our quality systems across to the National Standards for Disability Services in readiness for the NDIS.

The auditor's report commended Kurrajong Waratah for our "commitment to continuous improvement, and the plans that have been developed to prepare for the NDIS rollout in the near future."

We know that many challenges as well as opportunities lay ahead as we respond to the unmet demand for our services and in our transition to new models of service

Treasurer's Report



PETER PERKINS Treasurer and Life Member

Once again I have pleasure in presenting the Treasurer's Report and the Financial Statements for the year 1 July 2014 to 30 June 2015 and which indicate an extremely satisfactory result.

In the summary of "What We Earned' in the Income Statement on page 9 of the Annual Report you will note the entry "Net Assets on Consolidation of Yallambee Deniliquin" of \$2,199,000 which represents the transfer of assets from Yallambee across to Kurrajong Waratah following our merger. This is regarded as an extraordinary item and is not considered as relating to the operating result for the year from our normal operations.

Thus total revenue for the year was \$25.5m (\$27.7m less \$2.2m) representing an increase of 17% on the previous year due largely to an increase in government funding of 19% with lesser increases in the other income sources. State government funding of \$13.4m plus Commonwealth government funding of \$13.4m plus Commonwealth funding of \$16.6m or 66% of total revenue with income from our own businesses contributing \$6.7m or 26% of total revenue while fees/other income and fundraising contributed 6% and 2% respectively of total revenue. The Kurrajong Waratah Race Day at the Murrumbidgee Turf Club and the annual Art Union are not only major fund raising events but are also significant community events helping to profile the work we do.

Total expenditure for the year was \$24m which is an increase of 12% on the previous year and staff costs have risen 19% to \$15.9m which indicates that the majority of the organisation's expenditure, including the additional income that was received, is on the provision of direct services to our clients. Expenditure of this magnitude on wages salaries and associated payments has considerable impact, through the multiplier effect, on the economies of the local government areas in which services are provided.

Pleasingly, administration costs were only 6.8% of income which is a very low level when compared to industry benchmarks of 12-15% and higher.

The operating result for the year (not including the extraordinary "Net Assets on Consolidation of Yallambee Deniliquin") is a surplus of \$1.5m as compared with the budgeted surplus of \$306k. This better than budget surplus was largely due to several exceptional factors including a grant from the Environmental Protection Authority of \$688k,

and favourable processing fees that were received for our E-recycled material.

Operating surpluses are essential to fund our capital expenditure which is typically not funded from recurrent government subsidies, and to build a buffer for future unexpected business costs.

A sound asset base, liquidity, cash and working capital are keys to the survival and growth of any company. Kurrajong Waratah's Balance Sheet indicates that the organisation has further consolidated our sound financial base which has been established by past and continuing prudent financial management and Board governance.

The past year has seen a significant increase in the organisation's asset base and cash reserves. Total assets of \$39.8m and total liabilities of \$12.1m have resulted in net assets of \$27.6m. This year has seen the organisation's available working capital to be \$10.7m as at 30 June 2015. The Board has a facilities upgrade and service expansion strategy going forward, that will invest some of these funds in new and improved facilities for our services. The organisation's working liquidity, which is one of the measures of Kurrajong Waratah's overall financial health, is very sound with unrestricted current assets being five times greater than unrestricted current liabilities.

The implementation of the National Disability Insurance Scheme in this region in 2017 will be accompanied by some financial issues for the organisation with the traditional block funding being replaced by retrospective payment for individual services. This will create challenges relating to cash flow, liquidity and capital expenditure. However, the financial position of the organisation gives your Board confidence of meeting the challenges and of ongoing success in the coming National Disability Insurance Scheme environment.

Thank you to the CEO, Deputy CEO and my fellow Directors for their support and for the role they undertake in monitoring and maintaining the financial stability of the organisation. My special thanks go to Mrs Sharyn Atherton, Finance and Administration Manager, for her co-operation, dedication and efficiency.





Caitlin *achieves one dream* and sets herself another

Caitlin Andracchio is about to embark on her first paid employment job as a Laundry Worker at our Narrandera Laundry and Linen Service. This was a goal she had set herself and worked hard to achieve through Kurrajong Waratah's 'Transition to Work' (TTW) program for school leavers.

This is not Caitlin's or her grandmother Terry's first involvement with Kurrajong Waratah.

"It's funny how things go in circles," Terry said. "It is almost twenty years to the day that Caitlin first attended the Kurrajong Early Childhood Intervention Service in Wagga Wagga and benefited from all that was offered, initially every week, then monthly for three years."



On advice from the Kurrajong Early Childhood Intervention Service, Caitlin was enrolled in the Support Class at Tolland Primary School in Wagga Wagga for half a day every week for a year. She then attended preschool in Narrandera and mainstream schools after that.

Whilst at school in Year 10, Caitlin began a school-based work experience program with Kurrajong Waratah. This was followed by completing the 'Becoming a Worker – Certificate 1 Employability Skills' course under the TTW Program at the same time as undertaking work experience in the laundry and linen service.

As well as this work experience, Caitlin has also gained valuable work experience in childcare and at the local IGA supermarket with support from Kurrajong Waratah's TTW staff.

Caitlin will tell you she really enjoyed all her work experience placements where she has met lots of people.

"My skills have gone up the scale. In the future I would like to serve people, get money, learn more skills and work with people I know. I will be overwhelmed when I get a job," she said.

Vocational Training Officer at Cypress Centre, Rachael Hyde has seen Caitlin grow and couldn't be more proud of her. "Caitlin has come a long way from a Year 10 student. She has improved out of sight, taking on more responsibility. She is a great worker in our laundry business – unloading the bags of linen, sorting it, then loading and unloading the washing machines. She has also learned to flatten and press pillow cases with our industrial press."

Caitlin also uses other Kurrajong Waratah services in Narrandera such as the Independent Living Skills Initiative (ILSI) program that helps her develop her independence, recreation and social skills and to be more involved and independent in the community.

For grandmother Terry, the support from Kurrajong Waratah has meant a sharing of the load and more independence for both Caitlin and herself.

"We are very fortunate in having Kurrajong Waratah's services, particularly in Narrandera, and the caring staff have been 'the icing on the cake'. Caitlin has made so many gains and will continue to do so with their assistance," Terry said.

For her future, Caitlin is aiming to live independently from her grandmother in a supportive environment and would like to have her own transport one day.

Her entry into the workforce may just be the first step to achieve those goals.

Liam can now *tell* people what he wants

Liam is a 3 year old boy who lives in Batlow with his mum Peta and dad John. Liam was diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder at 2 years of age. At that stage, Liam's interests were limited to opening and closing doors repetitively. He was not interested in interacting with people and did not use any words.

Since he has been attending Kurrajong Early Childhood Intervention Service, Liam has received regular input of Occupational Therapy from Amanda and Speech Pathology from Sarah. Amanda recommended that Liam wear a special compression suit called a spio suit which assists him to feel calm and interact with people in his environment. Since wearing his spio suit, Liam has started taking turns in games with his parents, gains eye contact and smiles at people.

Sarah also started using the Picture Exchange Communication System (PECS) to provide Liam with functional communication so he can express his needs to lots of different people in his life including his mum and dad and carers at the childcare centre he attends. Since commencing PECS, Liam has started using a folder full of pictures to communicate his needs to people. He pulls the pictures out of a folder and gives it to an adult to "tell" them what he wants. He has also started to develop his language and has said words such as "bubbles", "more", "bot-bot" (bottle) and "bed time" which have been so exciting for his parents and everyone.

Conversation turns dream into *reality*

Lifestyle Services participant Michelle Hocking had a dream. She had always wanted to go into the middle of Lake Albert in a kayak, but never had the chance.

Support worker Deb Howard, who through conversation with Michelle, was determined to help her achieve her dream. So a plan was hatched to head to Lake Albert during a World Senses activity.

Deb says, "It took a little while to organise a tandem kayak. I had a friend who had one and he was happy to help out. My husband transported the kayak to Lake Albert so we could use it and he organised a life jacket for Michelle to wear."

"Michelle sat in the front and chose not to use the paddle. We went towards the middle of the lake and she was so excited about it. I asked Michelle if she wanted to go back and she said she wanted to go further out into the middle of Lake Albert, which we did."

Michelle was proud of her kayaking experience and told many people how much she loved it.

"It made me realise that we could go a step further and I suggested that we could do kayaking each week at the Charles Sturt University pool. We could use a kayak that I had purchased," Deb said.

But this time it would be different. Michelle would be on her own in the kayak.

"I organised with the University pool staff to use the shallow pool so that Michelle and other people I support could get the feel of balancing the kayak by themselves," Deb said.

"The activity turned out to be a great success and more people joined the kayaking session. We went on many occasions last summer. Michelle kept saying, 'How cool is that!' every time she had a turn."

"Everyone has asked if we can go kayaking again so we will put our lifejackets back on and hit the water again this summer."

"I'm pleased that I was able to help Michelle achieve her dream and I had fun as well. It really was a great adventure."



When Wayne Emerson isn't busy working at Waratah Industries, you will see him pedalling towards his new goal in our Skills Options Lifestyle Services.

After not riding a bike for more than 10 years, Wayne decided it was time to put the helmet back on and take up the challenge.

"I started riding a bike when I was a young boy. I used to ride around the yard at my house on the Central Coast," Wayne said.

"I soon learnt to ride a two-wheel bike and I enjoyed doing this for many years. But I stopped riding over 10 years ago and I thought it would be good exercise to start again."

As part of the plan to ride again, Wayne and Nikki Davis, a support worker with Kurrajong Lifestyle Services, spent a full day working on his new goal. "We practised for hours around the streets and parks of Lake Albert. I thought it would be good if I walked alongside and helped Wayne to steer," Nikki said.

"When Wayne first started out he was not very confident but he was soon zig-zagging his bike through the AFL goal posts on Lake Albert oval. By the end of the day Wayne was zig-zagging through much smaller gaps between posts on the Lake Albert oval canteen verandah.

"It was a great way for Wayne to get his confidence and skills back."

Wayne now joins a bike riding group who head to Lake Albert each week and explores the local community.

"It really made a difference to ride all day. It helped me to take control of the bike," Wayne said. "I've enjoyed learning to ride again and it's great to be able to go with the group every week. I love it."

Tom is loving the *choices he makes*

Carol and Chris Harmer thought their son Tom would settle in well at Kurrajong Waratah's Lifestyle Services program in Wagga Wagga after leaving school. But they never imagined that he would forge ahead with so many achievements in such a short amount of time.

"Tom has become more confident and independent since he started at the Lifestyle service this year," Carol said. "The service has really helped him to develop skills, and we have noticed that Tom has gained more strength because of some of the activities he is doing, such as woodwork, sport and car maintenance."



Tom was already familiar with our Lifestyle Services before leaving school, taking part in orientation sessions to the service while he was in Year 12. His sister Emily is also a Lifestyle participant.

"I think the orientation helped Tom as he knew what to expect and he felt comfortable with everyone," Carol said. "Tom is treated like an adult and we feel that this has contributed to his growth. He has made some good friends at the service."

Carol said Tom looks forward to attending each day and taking part in the activities featured on his roster. "His roster is full of variety and he has enjoyed going on several trips to Canberra with his colleagues during the year," she said.

"He is also eager to help with tasks at home because of what he has learnt at the service. He offers to put petrol in our car. I know that Tom worked hard at developing this skill during the year."

Tom is also proud of his Clean up Wagga Wagga activity.

"When we drive past any park he will purposely look to see if it needs to be cleaned. We also go for a drive past the park he has just cleaned and say how great it looks now," Carol said.

"We love that the service is person-centred and is in line with his interests and needs so that Tom can choose his activities. When Tom first started at the service he tried some activities but didn't like them and decided to change. We think it is great that Tom can speak up and have control over his roster. He really is learning to lead a life of his choice."

Organisational Overview

Operationally the organisation has continued to change and grow to meet the needs of over 1300 people with disabilities that we provide support to.

Once again there were many outstanding achievements and highlights across all sections of the organisation.

Merger with Yallambee Deniliquin completed

From 1st July 2014 the merger with Yallambee in Deniliquin was officially finalised. The merger has been very positive and brings the supported employment businesses, day services and accommodation services in Deniliquin, Finley and Balranald under the umbrella of Kurrajong Waratah. The merger has had a very positive impact on the services, staff, employees and people we support. The group home underwent an extensive renovation and the residents are extremely happy with the finished result. Last year Yallambee reached 40 years of service to the Deniliquin and surrounding communities and in November 2014 a very well attended dinner was held to celebrate this outstanding milestone.

Establishment of Change and Special Projects section for NDIS readiness

During the year a Change and Special Projects section was created to bring together our project initiatives and quality assurance to commence to deal with matters as we move towards the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS). An internal change group was formed which comprised staff representatives from sections of the organisation. The change group's role has been to support the initiatives being developed and ensure a focus on strengthening our person-centred culture for the people we support. This group has also been instrumental in helping staff to understand the different issues and opportunities that sections within Kurrajong Waratah will face as the NDIS rolls out in our operating area from 1st July 2017.

Quality Assurance has again been an integral and important part of our operations. External audits for our Commonwealth funded business services and our Environmental Management System (EMS) were successfully conducted with no non conformities. Apart from having responsibility for the above annual audits our Quality Assurance section facilitated Employee Satisfaction Forums, maintained our policies and procedures reviews, conducted Internal Quality Monitoring (IQM) assessments and facilitated staff training including Professional Practice workshops for new staff.

Our InterLink project that supports older parent/carers still with the responsibility of their son or daughter with a disability at home provided flexible and responsive services to approximately 500 families across the Riverina and Murray regions. To help sustain the wellbeing of older parents and carers, InterLink provided emergency respite care, future care planning, service coordination and linkages to local services, as well as



assisting ageing carers to work through government programs and forms and they also arranged specialist doctors appointments and consultations as required.

Our behaviour intervention training and support project 'People for People' (P4P) will soon be concluding. The resources we have developed in this project are being converted into online training packages and learning modules which will be a valuable resource for any disability services in the sector to access and use in the future. A Communities in Practice program (CiP) comprising local networks that meet regularly, offering managers of non-government disability service providers a platform to share personal knowledge, information and experience, was also completed during the year for services across the western region of NSW. This project was made possible with funding from our peak advisory body, National Disability Services.

Kurrajong Disability Solutions (KDS) have had a very busy year acting as the gateway to the organisation's adult services and referring people to the most appropriate Kurrajong Waratah services. There were 22 new referrals who secured a placement in our supported employment services or lifestyle day services.

Early Childhood Intervention and School Aged Therapy Services

Our Early Childhood Intervention Services in Cootamundra, Griffith, Tumut and Wagga Wagga again provided excellent early intervention services to 516 children and their families. Our school aged therapy services delivered speech pathology and occupational therapy services to 126 children and demand for this

Our Early Childhood Intervention Service:

- provided support to 516 children and families in 15 local government areas, including 389 from KEIS in Wagga and 127 from GEIS in Griffith;
- provided school aged therapy to 126 children through Speech Pathologists or Occupational Therapists.

service continues to grow. In addition, speech pathology services were delivered under a contract to the Riverina Medical and Dental service for aboriginal children.

Also during the year a new innovative training model for long daycare and pre-schools called the Teaching Pyramid Model was introduced. This training focuses on prevention, promotion and intervention that support all children to be included in early childhood, education and care settings. Our model was presented at the Early Childhood Intervention Australia conference in May 2015 and has been nominated for a NSW Disability Industry Innovation award in 2015 in the category "Leadership in community partnerships and transformations." The continuing demand and growth in this service area will see long overdue alterations and extensions made to the Wagga Wagga centre by early 2016.

Support Accommodation Services

Our adult and children's supported accommodation services in Deniliquin, Leeton, Wagga Wagga and West Wyalong comprise 13 group homes supporting 49 people with a disability in a safe and comfortable environment. Our respite care service supported 55 people and our Community Living Support Service in Wagga Wagga 14 people. There were also 37 people supported through Kurrajong Waratah's Independent Living Skills Initiative (ILSI) services in Narrandera and Temora plus Leaving Care and Supported Living Fund programs. In total 155 people with a disability received valuable supported accommodation support from our services.

Over the last 12 months there has been an increased focus on the person-centred culture in our service teams. Team meetings now actively discuss and use person-centred tools to help build a network of assistance for the interests and needs of each person that we assist and support. As a result many positive outcomes are occurring in each person's life.

Accommodation Services provided:

155 adults and children ranging in age from 10 to 64 across 40 locations including group homes, units and other premises in West Wyalong, Temora, Wagga Wagga, Narrandera, Leeton and Deniliquin.

Lifestyle Day Services

Our Lifestyle Services in Deniliquin, Leeton, Wagga Wagga and West Wyalong continued to provide an extensive range of personal options, skill development and interesting activities to around 107 people with a disability. There has been an increased focus on using technology and the different choices this creates for people we support. Many now are becoming proficient in using an iPad and our computer systems have been upgraded so people can use Skype to keep in touch

In our Lifestyle Programs in Wagga Wagga, Leeton and West Wyalong

80 clients received services;

the introduction of iPads for our clients has been very positive as has our continued involvement with the community through a range of activities and programs the clients choose.

with friends, family as well as with other people in our services across the Riverina and Murray regions.

Supported Employment (Business Services)

The supported employment businesses that we run in Deniliquin, Leeton, Narrandera, Wagga Wagga and West Wyalong provided valuable employment and training opportunities to around 173 supported employees with a disability.

Waratah Industries increased their intake of school leavers into our Transition to Work (TTW) program, providing excellent vocational training and other work readiness opportunities for school leavers. Safety was again a main priority in this timber processing business due to the amount of material processed and the machinery used. Our safety targets were continually met or exceeded. As part of Quality Assurance, Waratah Industries also successfully met the six monthly external audits in relation to the heat treatment process of their timber. These audits are compulsory for any timber or timber product which is exported out of Australia.

Kurrajong Recyclers had a major upgrade of its machinery and equipment at the Materials Recovery Facility in Wagga Wagga this year. The upgrade was partly funded by the Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) and the Australian Packaging Covenant (APC). Prior to the upgrade, three tonnes of kerbside household recyclables per hour were being processed. The upgrade now enables output at eight tonnes per hour with plans of further upgrades to bring the output to 10 tonnes per hour. Our glass crushing plant is completed and all glass received is now able to be converted into a substitute product for sand or for landscaping purposes.

Our Internal Maintenance section is a very valuable resource for the organisation. Apart from providing grounds and property maintenance to over 35 properties in Wagga Wagga and surrounding towns and fleet management for over 100 vehicles, this section also controls the school bus contract with the Department of Education.

Culinary Capers staff and our supported employees provided great products and service externally to local businesses in Wagga Wagga and internally to Kurrajong Waratah through catering services and the provision of fresh cooked diced chicken meat. We realise that we are operating this business in a very competitive business environment and as such we are looking at ways to provide a more innovative and customer driven service to increase our sales revenue.

As with Culinary Capers, our outreach supported employment services also operate in very competitive markets. Cypress Recycling in Narrandera recycled five tonne of recyclable material a week as well as providing lawn mowing and gardening services to Narrandera residents. The Narrandera Laundry and Linen Service increased their turnover by 15% due to the acquisition of new business from Griffith, Wagga Wagga and West Wyalong motels which was an excellent achievement. The Leeton Ironing Basket continued servicing the

processed 903,653 lineal metres of timber during the year - this would cover the distance around Australia 60 times;

maintained their strong association with the local timber operations and provided services to meet their needs.

Out by the truckload

 Kurrajong Recyclers processed 15617.85 tonnes of recyclable material during the year. That equates to 462 B-double truck loads

ironing and washing needs of Leeton residents for three days a week with the remaining two days operating from Narrandera. Spins Recycling in West Wyalong recycled seven tonne of recyclable material per week and Café Peckish continued providing excellent snacks, meals and coffee to local and travelling customers. A fundraising initiative by our West Wyalong staff, employees, clients and families during the year has enabled artificial grass to be laid at the front of the café to enhance the outdoor area which looks fantastic.

Our Internal Maintenance team

- maintained the grounds and property of premises owned and operated by Kurrajong Waratah;
- serviced and maintained over 100 motor vehicles in our fleet.

"Creating a history map, which is a person-centred tool, can lead to goal setting or just getting to know a person better."

"A history map explores things that someone has done in the past and new ideas can be generated from this," Karen said. "It's amazing how learning about the past can help develop the future and provide more opportunities for people."

Karen said that she had enjoyed talking to families and learning more about people Kurrajong Waratah support. "It was great to look back and remember Paul as a young boy. Paul loved looking at old photographs of his brother, Graeme and our pet dog. My family is keen for me to do the voice-over of Paul's history presentation so it would have a special meaning for him."

Karen said looking over old photographs had brought joy to people we support, their families and staff.

"I showed Lorraine Pitman some old photos one day and to see her eyes light up with memories was fantastic."

"I also showed Wendy Cowley her history map with photos of her family over the years. Wendy had tears of happiness in her eyes and kept thanking me. Her reaction made me cry. It was a very special moment for both of us."

Karen said looking back on a person's past had been instrumental in helping staff provide better support to people.

"It's nice hearing everyone share the different memories they have of their family. I feel really lucky to have been able to work on this project. It has been such a positive experience."

Annette McCaig said her family enjoyed reflecting and talking about the good times they shared with her son Paul as he grew up in Wagga Wagga.

Cherie *still loves her job* as much as on her first day

Life is like a scenic journey. Where we begin is often not where we end up, and for many, the journey is just as important as the destination.

This certainly rings true for Cherie Hughler, a staff member from our supported accommodation area.

Cherie's bubbly personality and passion for working with people made her a natural in Hospitality. Working in a South Coast café, Cherie loved interacting with customers. It was during this time that some of her regulars 'planted a seed' that would ultimately lead Cherie on a new life journey.

"Some of my regulars who were community support workers mentioned that I'd be excellent working in the community services sector," Cherie explained.

"My initial thought was that I couldn't do that, as Hospitality was all I'd ever known. But then I reflected on previous work as a family day care mum and realised that there had always been a little burning desire to work more hands-on with people."

The only thing holding her back was a lack of confidence to take the leap and change careers.

Things soon changed when she moved to Wagga Wagga and started cleaning the Kurrajong Waratah complex. Cherie's friendly and chirpy personality soon won many staff over. During conversations with Kurrajong Waratah staff as she cleaned, Cherie was often asked if she had experience working in the disability sector.

Cherie admits, "After a few months I realised that this was another sign!"

At that moment Cherie decided to take the plunge. She applied for work with Kurrajong Waratah and the rest is history.

"Five years later, I still love my job at Kurrajong Waratah, just as much as my first day," she said.

Alan *reflects* on 17 years with Kurrajong Waratah

Alan Larcombe who recently retired in August as Manager of Kurrajong Business Services reflects on his time at Kurrajong Waratah.

"My period of over 17 year's employment with Kurrajong Waratah for me was always rewarding, satisfying and full of challenges.

In February 1998, Kurrajong Business Services, that I was employed to manage, consisted of three small businesses providing supported employment to people with a disability in Wagga Wagga. By 2010 the number of businesses had increased to 10.

This growth occurred through increased productivity and from the mergers of Kurrajong Waratah with Spins West Wyalong in 2002, the Cypress Centre Narrandera and Leeton in 2005 and I also took on the responsibility for Kurrajong Recyclers in 2009.

I had the very rewarding opportunity to work with and support about 95 employees with a disability, improving or teaching them a range of employment skills, which by the nature of the varied businesses we operated, were quite diverse.

Another important responsibility was training for all Kurrajong Waratah staff and our supported employees across the organisation as a WorkCover accredited workplace health and safety officer. Owing to the incredible number of activities and services that Kurrajong Waratah provides there is a strong commitment to workplace health and safety. It is always of high priority. During my employment, I was continually presented with motivating, innovating and challenging projects and goals to work on. I found the energy and drive of the senior management team at Kurrajong Waratah to be the catalyst in my position as a Manager to achieve job satisfaction.

The future for Kurrajong Waratah in my view is very bright owing to the energy of the staff and the positive outcomes achieved for all of the people that choose Kurrajong Waratah as their provider to assist them and their families. Bill feels honoured to have been part of the Hildasid development

A call on members of a local church group to volunteer to remove an outcrop of Bathurst burrs at Kurrajong Waratah's newly acquired Hildasid property resulted in three gentlemen who felt they had the qualifications and time to answer the call for service.

At the time of presenting themselves for service, their ages ranged upwards from their early 80's. They named themselves 'Dad's Army' and affectionately referred to the property as 'The Block' so as not to confuse it with other properties they had been involved with.

The initial members were Life Member Herb Cowley, Athol Bryon and Bill Harris. Herb and Athol retired from Dad's Army some years ago due to health reasons.

Bill Harris, a tireless worker found he derived great joy being at The Block and his wife Heather recognised it added years of happiness to his life. Bill spent most of his waking hours there and was always planning ahead. Regardless of the heat or cold or the amount needed to be done, if he could see something needed doing he was quickly onto it putting people a quarter of his age to shame. He shared our sadness as we endured the challenges of three floods and our happiness when we found underground bore water.

Starting his day at 4am with an hour and a half push bike ride around Wagga Wagga, Hildasid wasn't Bill's only volunteer work. He regularly mowed lawns for 'elderly' people so they could remain in their homes, undertook pastoral work with his church and helped a niece run her property.

Bill turned 90 earlier this year and at a celebration in Ariah Park his sons spoke with great pride of the joy their father gained from the time he spent volunteering to assist Kurrajong Waratah and how beneficial it was for Bill.

However, recognising the need to be at home more to assist his wife, Bill recently and reluctantly retired, but knows he can always drop in for a visit or to lend a hand.

Current volunteers John Lane and Ray Beer, neighbours Paul and Lesley Gleeson along with Kurrajong Waratah management and staff have made it abundantly clear how welcome Bill would be to visit and no doubt seek his advice.

Bill was willing to reflect on his years of involvement as he concluded his 'Term of Duty' with 'Dad's Army'.



As Bill retires he leaves us with this message:

"As you pass through the entrance gate to 'Hildasid', Kurrajong Waratah's Community Farm, you are reminded of Dick and Maisie Nash whose relationship and generosity will long be remembered by Kurrajong Waratah. Because of their generosity we have had the opportunity to be involved with a small farm known to 'Dad's Army' as 'The Block'. Over a kilometre of the driveway, now features beautiful 'Red Spires' trees on both sides. The transformation of this road is due to many people who volunteered to make a real contribution to Kurrajong Waratah only three years ago, and today they can be justly proud of their effort.

It has been my privilege to be one of the many volunteers. There have been many changes at The Block during my time – four old sheds and two silos have disappeared and the old fowl yard has been returned to its former glory and is in production again. Water has been laid on to wherever needed and the hay shed roof has been repaired for which we are so grateful. Many other things have been done thanks to many who just wanted to help such a worthy cause.

Please do not think that I am trying to big note myself by saying it was not unusual for me to spend eight and sometimes more hours a day at The Block working on different projects. I just want to emphasise, and can truly say, that a days work at Kurrajong was never a long day because I enjoyed it so much.

To use words similar to those of a former President of America, 'it is not what I did for Kurrajong Waratah, it is what Kurrajong Waratah did for me, and I say thank you Cathie Smith and all the staff I was privileged to meet.






