Janna and Support Worker Debra Howard share a passion for book-making.

Each week, both explore their creative side when they meet in the Lifestyle Art Room.

"Communication is the key for our book-making activity to work. Janna is hearing-impaired and she signs what she would like to make," Debra explained.

With a degree in Graphic Design and a Certificate II in Auslan, Debra combines her skills to help Janna with her art and book-making.

"We both love book-making and creating something different each week. This activity has developed because our communication works so well," Debra said.

"I use Auslan to ask Janna what size book she would like to make, the colour of the covers and thread to use. During our activity, I sign to Janna instructions on how to complete tasks. If Janna doesn't understand she will sign back to me for clarification.

"Signing helps Janna communicate not just with the activity but also with being included in the conversation in the room.

"Janna likes to know what is happening around her and about everyone's weekend exploits. I have started to teach other people a few signs so they can communicate with Janna too."

Debra also runs an Auslan workshop for Lifestyle staff members to improve their communication skills.

"Before our fortnightly staff meeting, I help my colleagues learn sign language. This is beneficial for our team because it enables staff to communicate more effectively with Janna and other people we support," she said.

"It's rewarding to see Janna communicating with everyone around her and I'm proud of our team members for taking the time to learn new skills."

Report from the Chairman and Chief Executive Officer

It is a pleasure to be able to report on another busy but productive 12 months that has provided the opportunity to review and strengthen our services across our operating area.

Within the resources that we have available to us, our staff and volunteers have delivered a range of necessary supports and assistance to people with disability and their families in both a timely and effective manner.

There remains however so much more that is needed to be done to enable the quality of life of people to be improved, and their fuller participation as citizens in our communities.

In late November last year at a gala function held at NSW Parliament House, we were again recognised as a leader in the disability field through the 2015 NSW Disability Industry Innovation Awards. These annual awards for the disability sector recognise service excellence and innovations that are making a difference in the lives of people with disability and their families.

Kurrajong Waratah won the 2015 'Leadership in National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) Readiness' category for the work that we are doing in preparing ourselves for the changes that are coming with this scheme. The winning of this award is great acknowledgement of the efforts of many people at Kurrajong Waratah. It also benchmarks our organisation as being the only disability service organisation in NSW to have been selected as a finalist in all four years these awards have been running and as outright category winners in two of those years. In 2013 we won the category 'Excellence in Regional Service Innovation'.

To receive such recognition amongst our colleagues and peers in NSW is testament to Kurrajong Waratah being on a continual transformational journey to make even more positive differences to the lives of people with disability and their families. All our efforts and endeavours are strongly driven by our Vision: "For people with disability to lead a life of their choice".

As we enter our 60th year of operation in 2017, never have the challenges been greater, but never have the opportunities to make a more significant difference in people's lives been greater.

The future direction of Kurrajong Waratah is clear, as we know that we will enter the new National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) and a new operating and funding environment from 1st July, 2017.

Needless to say, our preparations for this future continued to drive a lot of our attention and efforts again this year.

This included the development of a new strategic plan for 2016 to 2018 which we are well on the way of implementing. The actions and tasks in this plan will ensure that we are strongly prepared for both the challenges and the opportunities that the NDIS scheme will bring.

The switch from receiving our government grant funding (which is over 60% of our income) up to three months in advance, to having to claim activity based funding in arrears will be one of those challenges. To assist us with this task and to implement other operating efficiencies, we are investing in a new, stronger information technology and communication platform. This includes a new approach to our IT infrastructure systems and the development of a robust client management system to facilitate choice and control for our clients and families as they become future 'NDIS customers' of Kurrajong Waratah.

As a key part of our preparations we are progressively meeting with all families to help them understand the new NDIS scheme. At the same time we are developing a better understanding of what their needs and wants may be in the scheme so that together we can pursue and deliver on their goals.

All our efforts and endeavours are strongly driven by our Vision: "For people with disability to lead a life of their choice".

Such investments and initiatives, without the restrictions of government program and grant guidelines in the NDIS that we have had in the past, will allow Kurrajong Waratah to further develop the range of possibilities available for people with disability. We are excited about this future, where people's dreams, their aspirations for themselves, for their life, can become a reality.

As we move towards full implementation of the new NDIS framework our reputation as one of the state's leading regional disability service organisations has never been stronger. We are confidently poised to build on our position of providing responsive, high quality and sustainable disability services and supports.

In closing, we would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone involved with Kurrajong Waratah over the past year. Our Board of Directors, our management team and staff. A sincere thank you to our volunteers, families and carers, to the business community, local Councils, our members of parliament and members of the public who have supported and assisted us over the past year.

There is such an extraordinary team of committed and motivated stakeholders with us on our journey forward. This provides us with great confidence to continue to bring about many more positive changes in the lives of people with disability and for their family/carers.

Treasurer's Report



HAMISH CULLENWARD Treasurer

Having succeeded Life Member, Peter Perkins after many years as Treasurer I have great pleasure in presenting my first Treasurer's Report and the Financial Statements for the year ending 30 June 2016.

The organisation is in good financial shape going forward. The total revenue for the year was \$26.5m representing an increase of 4% on the previous year (after excluding the net consolidation of assets from the merger of Yallambee Deniliquin in the previous year's accounts). This increase in revenue was driven by a 4% increase in government funding and was helped by an incredible 33% increase in fundraising, donations and bequests. A special mention and thank you is extended to all those who have helped contribute to that outstanding result by providing financial support or giving their time to our fundraising activities. We acknowledge the benefactor who supported our work by including a gift in their Will.

State government funding of \$14m plus Commonwealth government funding of \$3.3m resulted in total government funding of \$17.3m or 65% of total revenue. Income from our own supported employment businesses contributed \$6.9m or 27% of total revenue. These figures highlight the challenges of the upcoming transition to the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) for Kurrajong Waratah where previous payment of government income in advance will be replaced by a transition to a user pays system where funding for services will generally be provided in arrears. Kurrajong Waratah are currently investing in technology to adapt our systems to deal with this change in how we receive funding from government under the NDIS next financial year.

The Kurrajong Waratah Race Day held at the Murrumbidgee Turf Club and the annual Art Union are not only major fundraising events but are also significant community events that help to publically profile the important work we do. These and other similar events will be increasingly important moving forward in trying to become the first choice provider for people with disability in the Riverina and Murray regions of NSW under the NDIS, as well as essential for providing capital funds to meet the costs of infrastructure such as buildings, equipment, buses etc. that are not covered under the NDIS.

Total expenditure for the period increased 6% to \$25.4m on the previous year. Staff costs have risen 6% to \$16.9m representing that the majority of the organisation's expenditure is spent on services. Expenditure of this magnitude on wages, salaries and associated payments has a considerable impact on the economies of the local government areas in which our services are provided. Through the multiplier effect that arises from our operations there are considerable flow on economic benefits realised locally in the communities in which we operate.

Despite increasing costs, pleasingly our administration costs have remained at around 6% this reporting period. This is a consistently low level of administration cost when compared to industry benchmarks in the disability services sector that range from 12-15% and higher.

Our operating result for the year is a surplus of \$1.1m which, while being lower than the previous year (due to the consolidation of accounts from the merger of Yallambee Deniliquin) it is still an excellent result.

Operating surpluses are essential to Kurrajong Waratah to enable us to fund capital expenditure and maintain our assets which are typically not funded from recurrent government subsidies. They also enable Kurrajong Waratah to build a 'buffer' for future unexpected business costs or shocks. This view could not be more substantiated with our moving into the NDIS environment next year and the considerable unknowns regarding available government capital funds and investments that this transition faces.

Having a sound asset base, liquidity and working capital are keys to the survival and growth of any company.

Kurrajong Waratah's Balance Sheet indicates that the organisation has further consolidated the sound financial base which has been established by past and continuing prudent financial management and governance by the Board of Directors.

The past year has also seen a continued increase in the organisation's asset base and cash reserves with total assets increasing 6% to \$42.3m and net assets increasing 4% to \$28.7m.

Importantly, we have a healthy current ratio representing the ability for Kurrajong Waratah to readily meet any short term debts from our short term assets.

The implementation of the National Disability Insurance Scheme in this region from July 1 2017 will, as highlighted earlier, create challenges relating to cash flow, liquidity and capital expenditure. That said the financial position of the organisation gives your Board confidence in Kurrajong Waratah's resilience in being able to meet the challenges and opportunities as they arise. We have every confidence in ongoing success when operating in the National Disability Insurance Scheme environment.

In closing I extend my thanks to the CEO, Deputy CEO and my fellow Directors for their support and for the role they undertake in monitoring and maintaining the financial stability of the organisation. My special thanks go to Mrs Sharyn Atherton, Finance and Administration Manager, for her cooperation, dedication and efficiency.

Magical moments for *Bertie*

There is something magical about the snow.

Thanks to a good idea and the expertise of the Riverina Woodworker's Group, Bertie Wilton was able to experience the magic first hand on a rare family holiday.

Bertie, an adorable four-year-old, has severe physical and intellectual impairments. He is unable to sit, stand, walk, eat or drink unassisted and is visually impaired.

While he has no verbal communication skills, the joy on his face was unmistakable the first time he travelled through the snow in his custom-built snow sled.

Earlier this year, Bertie's parents Felicity and Richard Wilton met with Bertie's

physiotherapist at Kurrajong Early Childhood Intervention Service (KEIS), Donalee Gregory, and his occupational therapist Donna Bear, to discuss how Bertie could become more involved in family fun activities, like a trip to the snow.

Encouraged, Felicity came up with a few sled ideas, which KEIS then took to the woodworkers who expanded on the idea, adding in wider perspex skids, bolting in a special car seat and building a box to hold Bertie's medical equipment.

This wooden sled meant that for the first time in his young life, Bertie was able to enjoy the snow with his parents, big brother Reuben and his cousins.



"You don't expect these things to happen, and we are extremely grateful."

Felicity couldn't be happier with the outcome.

"The holiday was ideal, perfect, amazing, fantastic! We didn't realise how good it was going to be.

"Bertie loved the sound of the laughter and squeals of the other children. We were able to tow the sled with us wherever we went, so it was great that we could all be together rather than tag-teaming while one looked after Bertie.

Richard spoke of the family's gratitude for KEIS and the woodworkers bringing this idea to life.

"You don't expect these things to happen, and we are extremely grateful."

KEIS service manager Susan Macgillycuddy is thrilled to be able to help.

"It's wonderful that a gorgeous little boy can truly be included. When families dare to dream, there is a team at KEIS waiting to work with them and a community ready to pull together so their dreams can come true."

Ben's birdhouse takes *pride* of place

For two years, Ben Morgan dedicated every Wednesday morning to creating a birdhouse for his parents Juli and Paul.



"We are so proud of Ben for what he has achieved."

The birdhouse now takes pride of place in their front garden and is much-admired by visitors and passersby alike.

Ben's mother Juli said that the birdhouse is an amazing achievement for Ben, who has defied the odds to achieve something they thought he might never be able to do.

"Ben has a rare chromosomal condition called Tetrasomy 18p and is one of only 250 people in the world with this condition.

"He also has osteoarthritis and severe osteoporosis, and has been described as having the bones of an 80-year-old.

"When people are born with this condition, you're given gloom and doom about what people can't do, but no one tells you what they can achieve with patience and love.

"We are so proud of Ben for what he has achieved. We absolutely love the birdhouse and we are so thankful to Col Neyland (Lifestyle Services Community Worker with Kurrajong Waratah) for supporting Ben with this project."

Connected via the internet to the many families and carers of people around the world with Tetrasomy 18p, Juli said the Morgan family was thrilled to be able to share photographs of Ben's birdhouse taking pride of place in their garden.

"Ben is an absolute inspiration to the families of young children who have this condition," she said.

"When we look at the birdhouse every day, it gives us hope that Ben will continue to succeed in what he sets out to do. It shows us that the sky's the limit for Ben."

Making the *right* decision

For Bernie and Diane Kearins, having their youngest daughter Nicole leave home was difficult. Nicole has Down Syndrome, and for the first 31 years of her life, she lived with her family in West Wyalong.

Bernie reflects on the many emotions they experienced, and the exact moment they knew they had made the right decision.

Growing up in a small country town, Nicole has always been accepted for herself - no fuss.

Both our families were so supportive and caring and genuinely interested in Nicole. She was just part of the family.

She could swim like a fish, ride a pony, snow ski and dance. She played basketball and got so good, her free shot won a grand final for her team!

Her mates from school even insisted that Nicole make her debut with them at the local Debutante Ball.

But times change. Eventually, her school mates moved away, our other children grew up, got jobs and were spread out far and wide.

What of the future for Nicole? How would we secure her future, her happiness and her independence in a meaningful life?

For some time we had been urged to move Nicole into a group home at Kurrajong Waratah in Wagga.

I was hesitant because, from my few years on the Board at Kurrajong Waratah, I was aware of how many desperate and needy cases there were out there of very elderly people in poor health themselves desperately needing accommodation for a child with a disability.

Diane and I are relatively young and are thankfully in good health, so we decided that we could continue looking after Nicole at home.

Then Nicole started becoming introverted. She was spending too much time at home with just her mum and dad. Nicole's only outings were with us, which, in all honesty, were not always that interesting for her.

Kurrajong Waratah's extensive social network in Wagga, particularly the Skills Option range of opportunities, looked like the right direction but letting go and taking the first step is hard.

To "surrender" this special life that was so entwined in our lives for over 30 years... to entrust this special child with special needs to strangers... to have her living away from us, not knowing what was happening in her life every minute of every day. That was difficult to come to grips with.

But, with some passionate encouragement from the good people at Kurrajong Waratah, we thought being around people her own age would be good for Nicole and, much sooner than we anticipated, a place became available. Nicole now lives at one of the beautiful modern group homes at Olearia Place.

After about a month, we brought her home to West Wyalong for a visit. Nicole was in the kitchen, passionately "cleaning up" and putting things away, banging cupboard doors and talking rather loudly and animated (as she can!)

Diane and I were in the adjacent living room trying to watch the footy and Diane mildly chided Nicole about the noise.

Snorting her disapproval, Nic huffily went to her bedroom. When Diane checked on her a little while later, she found she had packed her bag. With hands on hips, she announces quite clearly that she is, "going to my home in Wagga".

That was it for us. End of the anxiety, the misgivings and the apprehension. The guilt evaporated. We'd made the right decision, hard as it is to let go.

That little kitchen episode showed that she was way ahead of us!

Organisational Overview



RAY CARROLL Deputy Chief Executive Officer

During the year again there were many outstanding achievements and highlights across all sections of the organisation as we progress towards the introduction of the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) from 1st July 2017 in this area of NSW.

Preparing for the NDIS

A lot of work is being done in developing our understanding of the NDIS and in preparing families for its introduction. A Disability Service Needs analysis has been conducted with families in the Temora, Narrandera and Leeton Shires to determine what services and supports people with disability and their families need now, as well as in the NDIS environment where they will have greater choice and flexibility. Our needs analysis strategy was extended to families in the Edwards Shire at Deniliquin, as well as the Finley Shire. Plans and resources have recently been put in place to carry out the needs analysis with families from Wagga Wagga and district and in the Bland Shire at West Wyalong.

The NDIS funding model that we will be operating under next financial year will see the end of government block funding grants as we know it, to funding on an individual basis. This change in the way funding is received will challenge disability organisations' cash flows with payment being received in arrears rather than in advance.

We are presently carrying out financial scenarios planning across all our services to ensure that we are prepared for the change in the way payment for our services and supports will be received. A new Information Technology system will be put in place shortly to better capture details and information of the people we support and their families, as well as enabling prompt and accurate billing of our accounts to the National Disability Insurance Agency (NDIA) who have responsibility for the NDIS. As part of reviewing our processes and developing greater efficiencies, a new electronic timesheet and staff rostering system that will simplify the recording of staff and employee's work hours in an NDIS environment will also be operational in the early part of next year.

Narrandera Supported Accommodation Development

Progress towards the construction of four two bedroom units in a supported accommodation facility in Narrandera has continued during the year. The existing buildings on the site were demolished early in the year, architectural plans were finalised and a Development Application was lodged with Narrandera Shire Council. Local and area builders were invited to respond to a 'Request to Tender' with four builders interviewed and invited to quote on the work. Tenders for the construction of the units have now been received, and it is expected that the facility will be completed by the time the NDIS commences next year.



The process of operating the facility will be dependent on people with disability receiving assistance and funding from the NDIS.

Kurrajong Disability Solutions

Kurrajong Disability Solutions (KDS) has continued in its diverse role as the main first contact gateway to Kurrajong Waratah for people requiring our children's and adult services. This section has responsibility also for all our Quality Assurance requirements and initiatives, managing the Older Parent Carers support program (InterLink), and assisting with change as we move closer to the introduction of the NDIS. Another important role is to facilitate the reporting requirements and track all funding received through the Commonwealth Department of Social Services and the NSW Department of Family and Community Services.

A new initiative this year has been to establish a Schools Connect Program in Wagga Wagga based on the successful program we initiated in our Deniliquin and Finley services. This program helps build positive relationships with schools and teachers while creating possibilities and outcomes for school students with disability.

Continuous service and operational improvements continued to be an important focus of our efforts. Our Quality Assurance section organised and facilitated the many external quality assurance audits for our Commonwealth funded business services, our Environmental Management System (EMS) and the heat treatment process for our timber destined for overseas markets at Waratah Industries. This section also facilitated a number of service satisfaction forums,

maintained our web based policies and procedures and conducted Internal Quality Monitoring (IQM) assessments of our services across the organisation.

Our InterLink Older Parent Carer Program provided essential monitoring, support and assistance to ageing carers across the region who still have the care responsibility at home of their son/daughter or family member. This year an important aspect of InterLink's work has been engaging with families in relation to the impending NDIS. A great deal of time has been spent listening to our families and assisting them to think about what their future care needs may be, not only for their son or daughter with a disability that they are caring for, but also themselves. It is intended to formalise this process by extending our Disability Service Needs analysis project to these families.

During the year the training and resources of our award winning behaviour intervention training and support project 'People for People' (P4P) was converted to online training packages and learning modules. This project was developed internally at Kurrajong Waratah and as an online learning and resource tool is available to any staff member working for a not for profit disability services organisation. Currently we are recording around 2,500 accesses per week to our online learning platform. Some organisations have advised that they are making the completion of the online modules part of their orientation requirements. This is indicative of this excellent resource that we have made available to all disability services in the sector to access and use for their staff.

Our Early Childhood Intervention Service:

- Currently provides support to 487 children and families
- Has centres situated in Griffith, Cootamundra, Tumut and Wagga Wagga
- Provides school aged therapy services to 73 children and their families
- and therapy services to 24 ADHC funded children and adolescents

Kurrajong Early Childhood Intervention and School Aged Therapy Services

Our Early Childhood Intervention Services in the Riverina Murray region continued to provide vital early intervention services to over 500 babies and young children and school aged children less than 12 years of age.

This year we have invested to position ourselves as a 'one stop shop' with the appointment of a psychologist and contracting the services of a paediatrician. We can now accept self-referrals, community referrals and referrals from medical practitioners and specialists. Our School Aged Therapy service was further expanded to include other Local Government Areas. Our strong association with local schools continued with the establishment of a relationship with schools in Leeton and Tumbarumba in addition to continuing and strengthening our current relationship with schools in Cootamundra and Tumut.

The Teaching Pyramid project which increased inclusive practices in early childhood was completed during the year. This was a very successful project and became recognised as a training and mentoring tool in our area. A DVD was also produced to support the use of visuals with families and children in their homes and in the community.

During the year our early intervention services building in Wagga Wagga underwent a much needed extension and refurbishment. This building now provides a pleasant and modern building for our families and staff to enjoy.

Supported Accommodation Services

Our adult and children's supported accommodation services in Deniliquin, Leeton, Wagga Wagga and West Wyalong have continued to promote a person centred approach in the provision of our various services. In adult accommodation we currently have 12 group homes supporting 47 people with disability in a secure and comfortable environment. Our short term accommodation (respite care) service supported over 60 people. There were also almost 55 people supported through our various supported independent living programs.

During the year a review of our adult accommodation services was conducted by an external consultant to determine what changes or improvements were required to be NDIS ready. The results of this review have now been received and were overall very positive. The recommendations emanating from this review are forming part of our preparations for the NDIS.

Lifestyle Services

Our Lifestyle Services in Deniliquin, Leeton, Wagga Wagga and West Wyalong delivered an excellent range of lifestyle options to over 100 post school leavers and adults with a disability. The activities provided were many and varied reflecting the individual choices and needs that people had and really enjoyed. In Wagga Wagga we marked the 12 year milestone for our "Art to Crow About" annual art exhibition which is an excellent achievement. "Art to Crow About" has been verv successful and our clients look forward to showcasing (and selling) their artworks to the wider community each year. The use of more technology and devices has continued to improve people's skills and choices. Staff also received training in communication with hearing impaired and non-verbal clients, including learning sign language.

Lifestyle Services

- Are provided to over 120 adults

Supported Employment (Social Enterprises)

The supported employment businesses that we operate in Deniliquin, Leeton, Narrandera, Wagga Wagga and West Wyalong again provided valuable employment and training opportunities to over 170 supported employees with a disability.

Waratah Industries recorded a well earned surplus achieved through a concentrated effort to reduce production and overhead costs and to ensure that all staff and employees were customer focused at all times. This was a very pleasing result against difficult economic and operating conditions. Safety in the workplace continued to be closely monitored with all staff and employees being involved in identifying and acting on identified risks that has resulted in the number of incidents being markedly reduced.

Waratah Industries

- Processed 2,379,092 lineal meters of timber last year
- Safety in workplace continued to be a major focus of staff and employees

Kurrajong Recyclers also recorded an operating surplus after adding back the cost of around \$300,000 to carry out necessary remedial work to underpin the eastern side of the main building. This work also involved extending the walkway along the MRF building to make it safer for all staff and employees to move between the two main recycling buildings. Recycled crushed glass sales have continued to improve as this new sand and small aggregate substitute product gains increased market recognition and use within the business community.

Recycling by the truckload

- 2,282 truckloads of mixed recycling from households was processed last year
- 462 B-double truckloads of recycling left Kurrajong Recyclers in that period
- That equals 16,180 tonnes of materials

Internally our Internal Maintenance Section continued its excellent service and support to the organisation. This section provides major assistance to all areas within the organisation through grounds and property maintenance in Wagga Wagga and surrounding towns and extensive and essential fleet management services to our fleet of vehicles.

Continuing to operate in a very competitive market Culinary Capers staff and our supported employees worked very hard this year. The rewards of this business are not always seen in the financial results but the feedback from the community and local businesses in

Wagga Wagga about the high quality level of catering and diced chicken produced is always very encouraging.

Our Outreach supported employment services at Deniliquin, Narrandera, Leeton and West Wyalong continued to perform well in competitive markets and delivering everyone a sense of great personal outcomes and achievements. Yallambee in Deniliquin comprising Reliable Catering, Divine Foods, A Team and Meals on Wheels all enjoyed good support from the Deniliguin community during the year and strategies are currently underway to improve the overall financial performance of these small businesses. Cypress Recycling in Narrandera recycled 250 tonne of paper and cardboard and provided lawn mowing and gardening services to Narrandera residents. The Narrandera Laundry and Linen Service continued to increase their turnover with 19,000 kgs of linen washed and 846 baskets of ironing completed during the year. The Leeton Ironing Basket, in addition to providing small scale linen and clothes washing, ironed 1,485 baskets which is an excellent output. Spins Recycling in West Wyalong recycled 240 tonne of recyclable material per week and a major achievement this year was being awarded a roadside rubbish removal contract with Telstra for the West Wyalong and Temora areas.

Meegan masters many skills

Moving to Temora with her mother last year, Meegan Lenham has spared no time settling into life in the community.

Shortly after arriving in town from the South Coast of NSW to be closer to family, Meegan joined Kurrajong Waratah's Independent Living Support Initiative.

Since then, she has thrown herself into various activities including volunteering at local radio station TEM-FM, painting and large sewing projects.

As her sister Michelle explains, Meegan had a mastoid in her ear burst at the age of one, causing severe damage to the right side of her brain.

"She was in hospital for two months. When she was released the doctors said if she survives, she will be lucky to even sit up. Within two years she could walk.

"It was very hard for me and my older sister to watch our baby sister try to do things. All we wanted to do was do it for her but if we did, we wouldn't have our sister as she is today."

According to Meegan's mother, Marie, this same determination has seen Meegan master many skills in the short time she's been at Kurrajong Waratah.

"Since coming to Temora, Meegan does cooking and sewing and has made a quilt for her bed and one for a new baby in the family. She also does art and has sold two of her paintings and got first prize in the Temora Show. It's a great achievement.

"There isn't a service we haven't tried and the staff at Temora are by far the most caring and competent. The way they treat Meegan and see her real abilities is great.

Our Staff

At a time when Kurrajong Waratah is anticipating significant growth in our workforce under the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS), we will undoubtedly continue to be a major employer in the Riverina Murray region.

We currently employ 243 full time and part time staff working across all our service areas (see service area map on page 17 of this report). We also employ 108 casuals which suits many of our staff who can balance their employment choice with study or family commitments. Many of our staff appreciate this flexibility.

Across the entire organisation our staff are focused on the people we support and delivering innovative and excellent services while continuing to look for ways to continually improve what they do. Many of our staff come from a diverse array of often unrelated backgrounds and it is rewarding to see them transition to disability services and bring their life experiences to their teams and the people they support.

Over 93% of our staff work directly with the people we support and their families through our programs and supports. The remaining 7% are employed in administration and support roles.

25% of Kurrajong Waratah's permanent staff have been employed for longer than ten years and 10% for over fifteen years.

The retention of long-term staff and the recruitment of new staff will be crucial as we enter the new world of the NDIS where increased growth is anticipated.

Kurrajong Waratah shapes *Michelle's life*

Michelle Sandow believes she wouldn't be the person she is today without Kurrajong Waratah.

When she started working at Café Peckish in West Wyalong 10 years ago, Michelle had no idea about the organisation.

Working as a casual each Thursday, it was only six months into her tenure at Café Peckish that her supervisor resigned, and Michelle was offered more hours.

This marked a significant turning point for Michelle.

"Taking on this position at Kurrajong Waratah gave me the opportunity to complete Certificate IV in Training and Assessment.

"I became the main supervisor for Café Peckish and soon after that applied to be the Vocational Training Officer (VTO). I now juggle a few different titles including VTO, café Supervisor, trainer for the Becoming a Worker program and I have assisted the organisation with a recent needs analysis in West Wyalong.

"During my time at Kurrajong Waratah, I have been given plenty of different training options such as NCI (Nonviolent Crisis Intervention) training, motivational interviewing, first aid and the list goes on.



"I was only 23 when I first started working at Café Peckish, and working with people with a disability from a young age has positively shaped the way I view life.

"The friendships I have built is something I will treasure. It has been a job with purpose and I wouldn't be the adult I am today if I hadn't worked for Kurrajong Waratah."

Michelle has much admiration for senior management who have been in their roles for long periods of time.

"It gives me a lot of confidence in the organisation and shows they really care. It's not just a job for them.

"I feel very blessed that I have been given the opportunity to receive employment through Kurrajong Waratah. Living in a smaller community there are limited employment options, especially employment options that build careers like I have been able to with Kurrajong Waratah."

Support and choices wins Cathryn over

Cathryn Bryant changed from a career in banking to a richly rewarding career in disability services.

A passionate Community Support Worker with Kurrajong Waratah since 2013, Cathryn shares her Kurrajong Waratah highlights.

How did you become involved with disability services and Kurrajong Waratah?

It was while working in a bank that I first supported people with a disability. This gave me my first insight to this type of work and I found I could connect with the customers. Before long I was working in a disability service as a support worker on weekends.

Through the years I have worked in various NGO [Non-Government Organisation] and Government roles including Community Visitor. When I visited homes as the Community Visitor, I chatted with various Kurrajong Waratah staff and management and was impressed with their passion. I was drawn to Kurrajong Waratah's adaptability through change and its commitment to giving all people great support and choices.

What has been your most memorable moment at Kurrajong Waratah or supporting people with a disability?

One memorable moment that sticks with me is taking James Kitney to Whitton Raceway to watch the V8 cars and seeing him in awe watching the cars and taking in the reality of how much noise and power the cars displayed.

What is the biggest challenge you face or have faced working in disability services?

Ensuring people have a voice and that they are heard and have their rights afforded to them like anyone else in the community.

What would you say are the three best things working in disability services with Kurrajong Waratah?

• Working with the people I support.

- The opportunities that arise while working with the people I support, and the adaptability and the opportunities that Kurrajong Waratah provides to them (for example, taking clients on holidays and weekend outings).
- Kurrajong Waratah Accommodation are always looking for the best outcomes for individuals.

Where do you see yourself in three to five years?

I really hope to be here in this role at Kurrajong Waratah. I really enjoy my role as a support worker watching the people I support grow with life experiences.

This vocation has taught me and given me so much throughout my life. I hope I can now impart my 30 years of knowledge to other staff who will then pass it on to the next generation of support workers.

Over 30 years ago I joined Kurrajong Waratah at a very exciting period of its history. As one of the six House Managers employed to work with the children transitioning out of the Children's Hostel, I lived and worked in the Sunshine Avenue Children's Group Home. Kurrajong Waratah had a brand new CEO, a new team and a completely new way of doing things.

During this time I formed very close relationships with the children, their families and the support staff and many of those relationships remain some of the strongest in my life.

After a few years I had the opportunity to go back to my original vocation and manage child care centres across the Riverina and eventually this led to me operating my own business as a consultant. I worked with a variety of businesses and not for profit organisations to develop policy and procedures as well as assist them achieve accreditation or certification in their respective sectors.

In 2004 I was approached by Kurrajong Waratah to work on several projects. These projects included facilitating a large number of staff to achieve the Certificate IV in Disability, overhauling the Orientation system for staff and developing policies and procedures and systems that could be accessed online.

It felt to me like returning home after a long holiday.

Eventually this work led to the opportunity of fulfilling the new role of Quality Assurance

Coordinator at Kurrajong Waratah. This is a role that has afforded me many challenges that sees me working on many projects across the organisation. My greatest challenge has been encouraging staff to understand the reasons behind their great practice – that knowing why they do things leads them and the organisation to continual improvement which provides the best outcomes for the people we support.

I thought my best satisfaction came from every time Kurrajong Waratah smashed an audit! But recently I watched a video of some people we support – whom I have known for over 30 years – enjoying a holiday at the Gold Coast. That showed me what my true best satisfaction was. Seeing them try new things, practice new skills, actively participate in the community and engage in meaningful relationships with staff who were so obviously committed to helping them lead the life of their choice; that is why I choose to work in this sector. It refreshed my enthusiasm for the work we do.

I am so excited for the future. I look forward to the opportunities the NDIS will bring to the people we support, their families, our organisation, our staff and our community. It is exhilarating to be part of this monumental change in Australia's social policy and I feel proud that Kurrajong Waratah will be an important part of this.
