Working Together Speaks Claudia's Language

A country girl at heart, Claudia Westcott was thrilled to relocate from Sydney to Wagga Wagga in January 2017 to take up a role as an early intervention speech pathologist with Kurrajong Therapy Plus.

Now assisting children aged between 18 months and 8.5 years with language, speech and feeding therapies, Claudia loves working with families and other allied health professionals to achieve great outcomes for her clients.

Why did you choose to work at an early intervention service like Therapy Plus?

Prior to this role, I had been working in schools in South West Sydney. While I loved the children I worked with, I found the private practice model quite frustrating at times and I was predominantly seeing kids with language needs only. In terms of my skillset, I was seeking a job where I would see a variety of clients with different needs.

Moving to the NDIS, where we have the opportunity to work with a variety of ages and a variety of needs, excites me.



What do you enjoy most about your work?

One of the things I love about my job is that it's quite varied – I get to see kids with a variety of needs.

It's also the interaction I get with families and of course working together with other disciplines (such as occupational therapists and physiotherapists) towards the client's goals.

Like any job it's going to have its tough days but this is a supportive workplace, so when I have those days, I can go and talk to someone about it and resolve any issues. I always feel like I'm being heard and that I don't need to solve problems on my own. We also celebrate the wins together.

Why is Kurrajong important to our community?

We're a not-for-profit organisation that works with people with disabilities, whether that be providing therapy support as we do here, or employment somewhere like Kurrajong Recycling.

As well as supported employment we also provide a range of Lifestyle Choices and Supported Living services – giving people with disability choice, because people with disabilities deserve as much choice as you and me.

I've heard that a lot of our adult clients who previously finished therapies at age 7, because that's where therapies used to end, or older adults who had no access to therapy services at all, are getting NDIS plans and are now choosing to come back to us for their services. That's pretty exciting. It tells you we're obviously doing something right.

If you could tell people one thing about Kurrajong, what would it be?

I think it's that we genuinely care. Everyone I've worked with here are genuinely here for the right reasons.

One of the things I like about this job is that we provide services to a range of families from a range of cultures and different socio-economic backgrounds. We're here for the people and I think that comes through in our work.

Nat's Driving Ambition

For the past 15 years, Nat Klein has been an integral member of the Kurrajong Property Services team which is responsible for keeping Kurrajong's buildings and grounds ship-shape.

"Kurrajong is a bit like extended family. They've taught me how to do the mowing, edging, operate the sprinkler system and change tap washers. Working here has helped with my confidence.

"I like working here. For one, I get paid and I'd get bored if I stayed at home!"

After several attempts, earlier this year Nat gained his learner's licence and is currently learning to drive.

"I wanted to get my licence so I can drive around by myself and if Steve, Thomas and Jim (my supervisors and support workers) want a hand, I can give them a hand.

"And I will be able to go fishing when I want to. Just take myself. It will come in handy."

In typical fashion, the Kurrajong team is supportive of Nat's driving ambitions. His supervisor Steve Chapple is proud that Kurrajong's support with things such as TAFE literacy and numeracy courses, and health and family issues has played a big part in Nat's professional and personal development over the years.

"For quite a few years we got Nat to go to TAFE, and we spent a bit of time with him on the computer, just doing practise tests for his driver's licence.

"On a personal level, Nat's mum recently had a stroke and was in hospital for a few months before going to The Haven. Our InterLink service helped get Nat's name on the lease, so he is able to still live in the family home. It's great that Kurrajong can assist in these ways and I know it makes a difference."

In the time Steve has known Nat he has become more social and talks to people more openly now.

"He's a good worker. He's ambitious, keen and he's motivated all the time.

"He's also got a great sense of humour and keeps us on our toes. He's got a story every day and a joke or three!

"He likes to have a bit of fun and I love it. It makes a difference to my day. It makes coming to work fun and, over the years, it makes you feel that you've achieved something as well."

Right now, Nat lives close enough to walk to The Haven to visit his mum but plans to drive there (and everywhere!) once he gets his driver's licence.

It is pleasing to report that in our 60th year Kurrajong has enjoyed another very strong year. It has been a year of growth and of strengthening our services.

At the same time our focus has remained on our preparations for Kurrajong entering and being successful in the new National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS). The transitioning of existing clients and realignment of our current services into the scheme commenced from 1st July this year and will continue over the next 12 months.

The challenge as we enter this competitive and commercially driven market place for disability service provision will be for Kurrajong to remain true to our historical values and our Vision for people with disability and their families.

The NDIS is new for everyone but particularly so for families and for people with disability. Our Kurrajong family needs analysis project that we have been delivering over the past few years has underpinned our NDIS pre-planning for families. Our staff from our Kurrajong First Contact team have been meeting individually with every family at times and locations that suited their lives. From these meetings a pre-NDIS planning document was created which outlined their personal circumstances and the disability services and supports that they needed.

This personal document has equipped families and people with disability to not only understand the new language of the NDIS, but it has also given them confidence in not being overwhelmed or confused about the processes of changing their current services from various Commonwealth and State government departments across to the NDIS scheme.

Importantly the information provided in our family needs analysis project enabled them to realise the opportunities that the scheme provides to have their reasonable care and support needs better met.

Whilst it is still early days yet, we are starting to see the benefits from this initiative for families in the increased range and scope of services and supports that they are being allocated in their NDIS plans.

With the NDIS has also come competition. We are witnessing some early growth in

competition from existing disability service providers and from new organisations entering or poised to enter what has been our traditional service delivery areas. This is not unexpected. With the size and scale of the NDIS it was always the scheme's intention that there would be developed over time a more competitive disability service marketplace.

Kurrajong too has plans to consolidate and expand our services as we build on the high levels of service satisfaction we have with our clients and their families. The NDIS plans that our families are starting to receive through the scheme, and the information we have gathered from our individual needs analysis with each family provides us with a strong 'blue-print' for this growth and expansion.

The future does still remain a little unclear with the NDIS still being developed, amended and reviewed as the scheme is being built to its completion. However we are confident that Kurrajong are in a strong position to assist families to have their service and support needs and outcomes better met under the scheme.

Kurrajong is fortunate in having a talented and committed Board who continue to monitor the implementation of the NDIS and approve the required actions and expenditure in our Strategic Plan that includes investments in technology and new administrative systems, building new facilities and investing in staffing resources.

Together with the support and commitment of our managers, our staff, volunteers, families and carers, the business community, local Councils, Members of Parliament, and members of the public we have great confidence in Kurrajong's future ability to successfully continue to flexibly meet the needs of people with disability and their families.

We take this opportunity to thank everyone who has contributed, or has been directly involved with Kurrajong during our 60th anniversary year, and for the achievements highlighted in this report that have been delivered.

Our vision is for people with disability to lead a life of their choice.



Treasurer's Report

Kurrajong is in good financial shape going into the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS). Total revenue for the year was \$30.5m representing an increase of 15% on the previous year that was attributed to increases in government funding and increases from fundraising, donations and bequests.

Government funding was 69% of our total revenue, with income that we generated from operating our social enterprises (which provide supported employment to adults with disability) contributing another 23% (\$7.1m) of the total revenue.

Total expenditure increased by 14% which was mainly due to the employment of additional staff for new services and areas. Apart from the benefit to people with disability and their families from Kurrajong's increasing our staffing and services, there is also the flow on impact on the economies in the local government areas through our employment of staff who live locally and spend locally.

The net operating result for Kurrajong this year is a surplus of \$1.6m. This surplus has been placed in our reserves to assist Kurrajong to fund future capital expenditure and maintain our assets, which are areas of expenditure not funded under the NDIS. Our reserves also enable Kurrajong to build a 'buffer' for any future unexpected business costs.

A special mention and thank you is extended to all those who assisted

us and particularly on the back of this year's results, I would like to acknowledge our benefactors (and their families) who supported our work and ensured our future by including a gift in their Will. Such compassionate gestures enables Kurrajong to plan and implement amazing projects such as the independent living units in Narrandera, the purchase of land in Deniliquin for future housing and the Hildasid Community Farm project in Wagga Wagga.

Once again many of the fundraising and community events like the Kurrajong Race Day held at the Murrumbidgee Turf Club were significant community events that provided the opportunity to raise awareness of Kurrajong, publically profile the important work we do as well as provide our supporters the opportunity to assist us.

The implementation of the NDIS from 1 July 2017 has created challenges for Kurrajong as it has the whole industry sector. Having a sound asset base and strong reserves are keys to the survival and growth of any organisation in this new operating environment.

Kurrajong has been able to achieve this by past and continuing prudent financial management and governance. That said, Kurrajong's investment in our staff, in technology and in adapting our systems over the past year to deal with the NDIS changes has placed us in the best possible position going forward.





Income 2016/2017







Since 1993, Craig has made the trip from Yanco to Narrandera to work at Kurrajong Laundry Narrandera (formerly Cypress Laundry & Linen Service), providing linen laundering services to hotels, motels and clubs in the Riverina.

"I fold sheets, press the pillowcases and wrap the sheets. We have customers from Narrandera, Leeton, Griffith, West Wyalong, Coleambally and Darlington Point.

"I like wrapping the parcels the best. I also like going out on deliveries and I like all the singing and dancing we do. It's a happy place. Oh yeah!"

Staff member Tracey Durnan said working with Craig is great fun.

"Craig is a very good worker. He's the best pillowcase presser, in fact he's a great all round presser but he doesn't like to do it all the time. He's very, very good at his job.

"We do lots of things to help Craig. If he has a problem, we try to work it out with him.

"The staff here do a lot more than provide employment support.

First Contact, the NDIS & You

Kurrajong is an approved provider of services and supports under the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS).

The NDIS is a Commonwealth Government scheme that provides funding for people with a life-long disability to have their reasonable and necessary support needs met, so that they can live as independently as they choose.

"To lead a life of their choice".

Kurrajong First Contact

The NDIS is a big change. It brings with it many new opportunities for people with disability and their families and carers. It's also a new system that can be difficult to navigate.

In anticipation of the introduction of the NDIS, Kurrajong established a 'one stop' information gateway called Kurrajong First Contact. Kurrajong's First Contact staff are NDIS experts. They have a thorough understanding of the scheme and are kept up-to-date with any changes made to the NDIS over time.

Located across the Riverina and Murray regions, our First Contact staff are available to work "one on one" with people with disability and with their families or carers to ensure they understand the NDIS and what can be funded.

Our team members can help you list the services and supports needed, and then assist in the NDIS planning meeting to ensure these are included in your NDIS plan. The NDIS planning meeting is important as it determines what package of funding for services and supports will be provided to each person under the scheme.

A First Contact free call number has been established so you can speak directly to caring and knowledgeable staff about any questions or concerns you may have about the NDIS.

What you need to do to participate in the NDIS?

If you haven't already done so, you can start to think about your needs and what goals you'd like to achieve in the future.

If you are currently a Kurrajong client, your existing supports and services can continue under the NDIS. You can also request other services and supports available under the scheme.

A Kurrajong First Contact team member is available to assist in developing an individual needs analysis, which sets out your needs and goals for the future.

In partnership with people with disability and their families, we have helped people develop their NDIS needs analysis for the past 18 months and our clients have found great benefits in this process.

As a direct result from NDIS pre-planning, we are seeing better quality outcomes with higher NDIS funding for service and support packages being approved.

Many people with disability and their families have already begun the NDIS process. Some are about to embark on it.

A number of families shared their thoughts about the process and the part Kurrajong and our First Contact team have played. We have the knowledge, commitment and desire to see people with disability and their families achieve NDIS plans that really reflect their needs and choices. Here are their comments:

"Kurrajong First Contact staff supported me through the NDIS process and that took a lot of pressure off. I'm just so thankful, because it's a lot to remember when you've got so much going on.

"Our Kurrajong Therapy Plus therapists who support my son Charlie are very informed so I got lots of information from them, and I am still getting lots of information even after we've got our plan.

"Talking about personal life and 11 years of doctors and behaviours is emotional. I remember going to my NDIS meeting and for the next two days it was a complete blur because it brings it all to the surface again, so having that support person from Kurrajong was very reassuring."

"Kurrajong First Contact came to my house and we went through everything, like what might come up in the NDIS meeting, and we made a summary report of things that I needed to remember at the meeting.

"They were right across the whole scope of my son Nathan's needs and assisted in determining the goals we could set. They encouraged me to think about goals that perhaps I hadn't thought about. Help with NDIS Invaluable

Luci Achilles thinks of Kurrajong as family.

For the past 11 years Luci has drawn on the support of Kurrajong staff, starting when, as a baby, her son Charlie was referred to Kurrajong Early Intervention Service (KEIS) as it was then known.

Charlie attended KEIS – now Therapy Plus – until age six. But then, like many school aged children, he was left without therapies.

Luci and her family found this period incredibly difficult, particularly as they were left alone to navigate costly therapies for Charlie.

"It was an isolating experience. We were having to do everything privately and I struggled with finding products and information.

"Even though we were no longer part of the service, I still had a couple of contacts at Kurrajong that I'd regularly ring and ask, 'Is there anything you can help me with?'

"They still took my calls and helped me with what they could, which meant so much. They have been a lifeline."

Luci was pleased and relieved when Kurrajong's School Aged program became available in 2016.

"I'm glad that they've put in this program because there's no gap any more. I feel so thankful for the families coming after us that won't have to go through the same experience – they'll just continue through."

Luci was again able to draw on the support and expertise of Kurrajong staff this year in developing Charlie's NDIS (National Disability Insurance Scheme) plan.

"Kurrajong was very quick off the mark, helping me with draft plans," Luci explains.

"I had about three informal meetings with them, just to talk about behaviours and home situations.

"Because they're so friendly and I know them quite well, we were just bouncing ideas and they remembered things I didn't even think about.

"They also supplied letters from the therapists to support our plan, because for the NDIS you really have to prove what you're after and why you need it."

For Luci, this staff support took the pressure off to know the ins and outs of the NDIS system.

"I didn't understand much about it. I work full-time, so I wasn't able to go to information days but I know Kurrajong staff went to all of those NDIS seminars and were very informed. I got lots of information and am still getting lots of information – even now we've got our plan.

"Debbie Young who is normally part of Therapy Plus but also a First Contact team member at the present time also came to my NDIS meeting for my final plan at Intereach as our support person.

"I'm just so thankful that they were there because it's a lot to remember when you've got so much going on and you're in such unfamiliar territory. Talking about your personal life and 11 years of doctors and behaviours, it's emotional. It brings it all to the surface again, so having that support person was very reassuring."

Luci is now very happy with Charlie's NDIS plan.

"He's been having therapies once a week at the moment – speech one week and OT the next – and Charlie has a fabulous rapport with his therapists.

"The NDIS means so much. Now we're not financially struggling and having to choose what's more important, speech or OT, or between Charlie's therapies and our other children's needs. It frees up that financial side of things.

"It also gives him so many opportunities. He gets to have the range of therapies he needs. He's having OT, speech, we've got physio happening. He's getting it all and, as his needs change, so will his therapies.

"I feel a lot better knowing that with the NDIS and with Kurrajong's support, Charlie will function to the best of his ability. People say that these kids' abilities are stronger than their disabilities and I feel that with Kurrajong's support, they will really thrive."









Organisational Overview

This year has proven to be a great challenge for everyone in the organisation as we continued to prepare for the introduction of the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) on 1st July 2017 and at the same time not forgetting that we still had to attend to the current day to day requirements and issues in our social enterprises and services in our current operating environment.

NDIS

In September 2016, in readiness for our entry into the NDIS we became an approved registered NDIS provider to deliver services under the scheme.

To assist with the transition to the NDIS we commenced a new support unit called First Contact. First Contact's role is to assist families and clients across the Riverina Murray region with developing their NDIS plan and to answer any questions or concerns they have about the scheme.

In preparing for the NDIS we have completed or are in the process of many new initiatives and improvements some of which are listed below:

- Successful completion of our NDIS pre-planning Disability Service Needs Analysis for families and clients
- Development of a Client Management System called CTARS.
- Replacement of our old service brands with 6 new service brands.
- Appointment of a Marketing and Communications Manager.

- Appointment of a Human Resource Manager.
- Development of a new website.
- Extensive training and upskilling of staff in the organisation and coordinating new processes across multiple remote
- Complete revamp of our external signage displaying our new brand.

- Internal live streaming webinars to share information with staff across the region.
- Revamp of the staff newsletter now called Konnect.
- Implementation of a rostering and timesheet system called EmpLive.
- Upgrade to a single cloud based data storage system replacing our ageing servers.

Although the implementation of the Client Management system is still a work in progress a number of milestones have been achieved as we move towards full implementation. The system is now active and ready for billing and we have successfully transitioned people to CTARS as they receive their NDIS plan.

Social Enterprises

Our social enterprises mostly performed well in some tough markets and continued the excellent outcome of employing over 160 people with disabilities in our businesses.

Kurrajong Timber continued its strong association with the local timber operations providing services to meet their needs. Internally the focus has been on providing appropriate training to staff and employees and maintaining a strong Work Health Safety awareness in the workplace. In addition Kurrajong Timber underwent a compliance audit conducted by our funder, the Department of Social Services. This audit revealed no issues which was an excellent result.

Kurrajong Recycling were successful in obtaining the contract with Wagga Wagga City Council to process kerbside recycling material for the next seven years commencing in April 2018. With a partial financial contribution from the EPA, the in-feed system in the MRF has been upgraded and a new front end loader was purchased. The result of this investment had increased the output capacity of the plant from 8 tonnes per hour to 10 tonnes per hour. This increased capacity now provides the opportunity for other shires in the region to send their recycling product to us for processing as Griffith, Leeton, Narrandera and Lockhart shires currently do.

Kurrajong Catering in Wagga Wagga had a disappointing year financially and as a result some changes have been made to the staffing structure and the type of work we do. Our focus now will be on catering internally and externally to various businesses. This change in direction presents not only new challenges but also opportunities for our employees by cooking a whole new range and type of food from which we anticipate will show positive results.

Kurrajong Laundry in Narrandera has had an extremely busy year providing laundry and linen services to motels in Narrandera, Griffith and West Wyalong. Kurrajong Recycling in Narrandera has been business as usual as we continue to look at various business opportunities to increase income in that area. Kurraiong Laundry in Leeton has maintained a steady flow of customers. Kurrajong Café in West Wyalong has had a challenging year and we are presently looking at ways to improve this business. Kurrajong Recycling in West Wyalong not only continued its recycling activities but maintained the contract to clean 24 Telstra sites throughout the shire. Also this year we commenced a new contract under the NSW Government's "Public Works and Procurement Regulation 2014". The contract is with the Department of Primary Industries for the cleaning at Narrandera Fisheries and is working well.

Our social enterprises in Deniliquin comprising Kurrajong Catering, Kurrajong Café and Kurrajong Property Services all had busy years with a notable addition of the much needed Cool Room Freezer for Kurrajong Catering. This was made possible by a community grant through the Edward River Shire Council and has given much needed extra room, bench space and an opportunity to grow the business further.

InterLink

In the new environment of the NDIS our Older Parent Carer Program, InterLink unfortunately will wind down sometime during the 2017/18 financial year as this program is designed for the carer not the individual person with a disability as the NDIS is. The staff of InterLink have provided a terrific service to well in excess of 530 families during its 10 years of operation. These families have received financial and other much needed assistance they would not have otherwise received if InterLink did not operate this program.

Kurrajong Therapy Plus

Apart from providing transdisciplinary services to over 450 children with disabilities in the Riverina Murray region the introduction of the NDIS has seen Kurrajong Therapy Plus begin to deliver services to adults with disabilities which has never happened before. This exciting new innovation has resulted in the employment of a Speech Pathologist specifically for adults and we are certainly seeing the benefits of this appointment.

Our very successful school aged therapy services were extended to provide supports to 150 school aged children in Wagga Wagga, Tumut, Cootamundra, Temora, Griffith, Hay, Hillston, Coolamon and Junee. In addition a full time therapist was appointed to work with 9 - 18 year olds.

In preparation for the NDIS we took up the invitation to participate in the NDIS transitional Early Childhood Early Intervention (ECEI) approach in NSW. As an ECEI Transition Provider we are now able to continue providing information, short term supports and referral to mainstream services to children aged 0-7 years and their families.

During the year many noteworthy activities occurred such as the Playconnect group in partnership with Playgroup NSW commenced in February 2017, we hosted a Pictorial Exchange Communication workshop for 25 people and we provided Early Childhood Intervention placements for medical students.

In addition to this our second allied health scholarship commenced in January 2016 and a paediatrician was contracted for 1 day per month for families who could not otherwise afford to access a paediatrician.

Lifestyle Choices

As part of preparing for the NDIS, Lifestyle Choices Wagga underwent an extensive project of redefining the current service model to operate in the new NDIS environment. We believe that this model will be able to respond to clients' needs as they have their NDIS plans approved and will give clients greater choice as to when and what type of service they will receive which is what the NDIS is all about. Construction will soon commence on the Hildasid Community Farm Project which when completed in mid 2018 will provide another physical facility for clients to choose to attend. The Art to Crow About art exhibition was again an outstanding success with many paintings by our clients selling quickly.

Lifestyle Choices in Leeton and West Wyalong continued to provide quality services to our clients and while at this point are not as advanced as Lifestyle Choices Wagga in their NDIS preparation there won't be any problems once NDIS Plans start coming through for their clients.

Lifestyle Choices in Balranald, Deniliquin and Finley have been very proactive in ensuring clients get the best result from their NDIS planning meetings to ensure that they receive the supports that they need to improve their lives. The past year has seen an increase in the overall number of people supported and the opening of our service in the Deniliquin CBD which is used 5 days a week was much needed to relieve the pressure at our main premises in Napier Street. This new service has also become the hub for evening activities and being in the CBD now makes it easy to access for everyone to attend. The Schools Connect program in Deniliquin and Finley have been great successes with both Deniliquin and Finley High Schools having a tremendous response from both students and teachers with 17 students volunteering their time to support 13 fellow students with a disability in their schools to attend school events and monthly fun activities that the service organises.

Supported Independent Living

The last 12 months has seen our preparation for the NDIS taken to a new level. Staff are getting used to the electronic rostering and timesheet system which commenced in October last year and training has commenced for staff on the new CTARS Client Management System and recently introduced Activity Logs for the NDIS reporting requirements. The staff have been excellent in embracing these new administrative requirements and understand the importance of them while maintaining a person centred approach to the supports that they are providing each day.

With the introduction of these new systems Team Leaders are able to easily and quickly communicate with staff which enables much better decision making which greatly benefits and enhances the support to our clients. Also it enables sharing information and linking the Supported Living teams and other services to better meet the clients' aspirations.

During the last 4 months of the year a lot of time was spent preparing clients and families for their NDIS planning meetings. NDIS readiness client forums for people in our Supported Living services were held and well received culminating in over 40 NDIS planning meetings taking place in a very short time frame which were always attended by someone from the organisation to support the family and client.

As always there were plenty of activities for the clients during the year including dances held in Narrandera, Wagga Wagga and Temora, client holidays, live concerts and shows and a social day out in Narrandera (fun day). These activities are very important as it links clients to the community and creates social opportunities for them to form friendships with a wide range of people.

Across the Riverina Murray region our Supported Living services comprise 12 Group homes in Deniliquin, Leeton, Wagga Wagga and West Wyalong supporting 45 residents, Community Living Support Service in Wagga Wagga supporting 19 people, Independent Living Support Initiative (ILSI) supporting 28 people in Narrandera and Temora in various programs, Short term accommodation provide respite to 55 families and 3 smaller support programs in Wagga Wagga supporting 10 people.

Kurrajong Property Services have continued to provide a great service looking after our large vehicle fleet and properties in Wagga Wagga. A new initiative this year has been the acquisition of the cleaning contract at the Agricultural College with the Department of Primary Industries. Like the Narrandera Fisheries contract but on a larger scale, this contract has been a welcome addition as it provides an excellent opportunity for our employees to broaden their skills.

The Finance and Administration department and Kurrajong Foundation have again done a tremendous job providing accounting, payroll, fundraising, organising functions and other administrative services across the organisation. Their skills and expertise will be required on a much larger scale as we fully rollout in the NDIS and I know that we have talented and committed staff in these departments who will continue to provide these services to a high level in the new environment of the NDIS.

Finally, I would like to thank our CEO, Steve Jaques for his continued advice and support during the year. Also thanks to the Managers and staff who have all done a great job preparing for the NDIS.

Kurrajong Helps Make Work Dreams Come True

Joel Jenkins is living proof of the power of Kurrajong's Transition to Work program.

Joel, 19, first became involved with Kurrajong when he was at school.

"It all started when I was at school," Joel explains. "I wasn't learning well and was really struggling, so the school contacted Kurrajong First Contact (previously called Kurrajong Disability Solutions) and I met Norm Corcoran.

"We had an interview with Norm and I ended up doing three days work placement at Kurrajong Recyclers' electronic recycling each week."

Joel became part of the Transition to Work program, which helped build his skills and readiness for employment.

"I got a lot out of it. We did our First Aid, our White Card training. We got to have a look around the Turvey Park Fire Station, which was a lot of fun.

"I had work placements at Kurrajong Recyclers, then at the RFS (NSW Rural Fire Service) and at the SES (State Emergency Services).

"The Transition to Work program was just fantastic.

"They helped me to finish school and then helped prepare me for the job. All the staff and everyone was so kind and they helped with building practical skills."

It was during work placement with the RFS that a full-time position with the State Mitigation Support Service became available.

With support from both the RFS and Kurrajong staff, Joel applied for the position and was asked to complete a practical assessment to test his physical ability to do the job.

"When I completed that, I was nervous waiting for the results. I didn't get the results for a few weeks after, so I just had to wait for a phone call but then they rang me and I got the job. It was great!"

Joel is now employed as a full-time Crew Member with State Mitigation and assists the team undertake mitigation work, such as clearing fire trails.

"Everyone I've met since I got into Kurrajong and the RFS have been absolutely fantastic to me."

"We also do aid work for the elderly – like cutting their lawns, cleaning their gutters out and chopping down overgrown vines – and support the districts if they need trucks moved.

"I like everything about the job. All the maintenance, all the chainsaw work, the brush-cutting, talking on the radios and stuff.


"I really love hard work, and from day one, the people have been wonderful. Everyone I've met since I got into Kurrajong and the RFS have been absolutely fantastic to me and they're really easy to get along with."

As well as securing full-time work, Joel credits Kurrajong with helping him become a volunteer firefighter for his local brigade in Coolamon.

"The Transition to Work program was the best thing I've ever done. I've got a job out of it thanks to Kurrajong and the RFS then encouraged me to become a volunteer firefighter, so if it wasn't for Kurrajong, I wouldn't be where I am today.

"I love helping people, helping the community. That's very important to me to look after our community and protect lives from raging bushfires.

"I'm also happy to encourage other people to talk to Kurrajong about what they need and let them know that it really is possible to get a job."

Support Coordinator Karin Thompson said Kurrajong supports Chris in building his skills and confidence.

"If we're going to introduce something he has never done before, we'll research it, print things out and help him gain his confidence to have a go. He tries just about anything.

"I was less confident before I came to Kurrajong," Chris said. "I have more skills now and I like coming here to see my friends."


Chris's mother Linda describes Kurrajong as very important to the Leeton community.

Tim's Career Change Changes His Perspective

Tim Glanvill is a plumber by trade who more or less grew up on the job having started his apprenticeship at age 16. Plumbing was just what he knew.

About 12 years ago, Tim decided it was time to "try something different", something he might enjoy. This decision saw him swapping his boots for a job and work environment far removed from the blokey world of tradies and tools – caring for people with disabilities.

Although it took a number of years for the change to stick, today Tim is a Kurrajong community support worker who has been assisting people with their daily living activities in their group home and the community for the past five years.

"It's a great job – just the interaction with clients and the banter.

"It was a bit of an adjustment at first but I've learnt a lot. In my experience, people with disabilities are very determined, don't whinge or complain much but just get on with it and make the most of things.

"There's this tendency to live in the moment and not overcomplicate things. When I spend time with these guys, I seem to forget a lot of my own worries. I think it helps you put things in perspective.

"Although there is such a wide spectrum of disabilities, I honestly think everyone would benefit from spending more time with the people I work with. They teach you so much. I would like my kids and nephews to spend a bit more time with them because I know they would benefit."

Although Tim's very happy with his job, he's careful to not make it sound too "rosy".

"It's not always enjoyable – some days are diamonds and some are stones. I guess dealing with humans you just never know what you're going to get.

"Sometimes it's hard dealing with difficult behaviours and people getting upset. But I'm realistic – I am there to support them, it is their home and they are just as entitled as anyone else to have their 'off days'.



"But we do also have fun and I love seeing them happy. It is a job that I generally really enjoy."

When asked why he thinks Kurrajong is important to our community, Tim says it's quite simply an organisation that takes good care of people that need it

"Kurrajong is very important for people with disability. These are vulnerable people that need to be looked after and with Kurrajong, it's a better life.

"It is an organisation that looks after clients very well. Clients really are the number one priority." I think Kurrajong is also important for the families of the people with disabilities. I have three young children and it's busy. I cannot imagine how much more difficult it would be having a child with disability - it can be a lot of work and comes with its challenges on a 24/7 basis.

"I believe it's just circumstance that differentiates us all and I'd like to think that if I was in that circumstance someone would look after me or my loved ones with the same level of care that Kurrajong provides."

Tim says it's quite simply an organisation that takes good care of people that need it.





Our Staff

At Kurrajong, we have an amazing team.

Our staff members are an integral part of the communities in which they live and work; people who really care about the wellbeing of our clients.

We are proud of their passion, commitment to excellence, and their drive to make a difference.

Currently our workforce totals 544 - 382 staff and 162 supported employees. This is a mix of full-time, part-time and casual staff which allows flexibility for our clients, and flexible employment options for staff who often have busy and diverse lives outside of Kurrajong.

Jobs at Kurrajong are diverse jobs. They include direct care roles within our Supported Living and Lifestyle Choices sections, allied health roles within our Therapy Plus section and in industry training, and business and production roles within our Social Enterprises businesses. In other sections of the organisation, staff are employed in administration, finance, information and marketing and in community support and fundraising activities.

With a range of new opportunities for people with disability under the National Disability Insurance Scheme, it is expected that the number of disability service jobs in the sector will increase dramatically. As a result, we expect Kurrajong's workforce to grow in the coming three years.

Ensuring Kurrajong has the capacity and capability to meet the projected new growth in jobs is vital. Our plans are set out in our Workforce Capacity Strategy.

A Career To Crow About

"I absolutely love it. I say to people, 'It took me 25 years to find this job and I'm so pleased I'm doing it now'."

Meet Debra Howard, educator and arts lover.

When Debra started working as a casual arts teacher at Kurrajong 10 years ago, she had no idea the job would have such a profound effect on her.

Debra had trained in childcare studies and worked as a special needs assistant at a preschool before completing her degree in Graphic Design (with Honours). It was only at the end of four years of study that she realised she didn't want to be a graphic designer.

Starting out as a casual, today Debra works in the Kurrajong Lifestyle Choices art room in Forsyth Street and introduces Kurrajong clients to different artistic techniques.

"You can bring in lots of different things and say, 'Look this is what this artist does' but ultimately, the client will do what they want to do and that's the nice thing about it. It's absolutely beautiful.

"It's sort of like outsider art. It's very raw. Some of it looks childlike but it's not, really.

"For example, our birdcages don't look like birdcages you'd buy downtown. They're a bit quirky and they're different. I absolutely love the uniqueness of it."

Since joining Kurrajong, Debra has helped curate the Art to Crow About exhibition. Each year, she and fellow Lifestyle Choices colleague Dianne Phelps pool their ideas for the exhibition. "We bring together 30 or so ideas and put them to the guys, so they can choose what they want to make.

"I think that choice is extremely important. People with disabilities should be treated exactly the same as anyone else is treated and have choices and creative freedom.

"Art to Crow About opening night is always fabulous. It's so nice to actually see the art up on the wall and look at the guys' faces. They're so proud of their work.

"I get a little bit emotional when someone comes up to me and says, 'Deb! My work sold'."

Debra explains that working with people with disabilities has given her so much, including many "warm fuzzies".

"I enjoy the interaction with people with disability. If I didn't have that, I'm not sure I would stay.

"I had three weeks off last year and when I came back to the art room, all of the artists had done a portrait of me and hung it up and I just bawled. It was really amazing.

"They give you so many warm fuzzies. If you have a day off sick they'll make you a card. Who else does that? Not even your friends do that!

"I think Kurrajong has taught me to go into bat for people with disability. I think I have a really strong empathy for people with disabilities now.

"I'd like everyone to know that people with disability are people first."



Freedom To Be Creative

Each Thursday, you'll find Kiara Vella doing something she loves – making art.

For the past year, Kiara has joined art classes as part of Kurrajong Lifestyle Choices and enjoys being able to use her hands and her imagination.

"I am a creative person and I like being able to make things up.

"I do art at home sometimes and I used to do it at other places as well.

"On the first day I tried here, I instantly loved it and thought Kurrajong would be the best place to be."

Kiara has experimented with a variety of mediums including paint, sculpture, collage and felting. She quite often has three or four different projects on the go at any one time.

"I don't really have a favourite thing. I just love it all.

"It's always so much fun. You can be creative in what you want to do.

"I like fantasy stuff."

One of Kiara's artworks – a painting of a dragon – was selected to be part of the 2017 Art to Crow About exhibition.

"My dad came. He was proud. I was proud too!

"It was nice to see the other art work. I like going to galleries to see art. I love seeing how people have different techniques in their paintings."

Along with art classes, Kiara does other activities with Lifestyle Choices. She particularly likes photography and ten pin bowling and thinks it is great to get to meet new people.

"Kurrajong is a bit like a big family. I've got two brothers who actually joined Kurrajong. They do different things to me.

"At Kurrajong, we always have a lot of fun. It brings me friendships."

Phillip's Handy Contribution

Kurrajong Recycling has a 98% electronic materials recovery rate. Phillip Pumpa is proud to play a part in this great achievement.

Three days a week, Phillip joins his friends at Kurrajong Recycling to dismantle computers, televisions and other electrical equipment down into their components – like copper wires, metals and glass – to prepare for recycling.

Because this process is done by hand, the amount of material that can be recycled is far higher than what other automated processes generate.

"It's a good place to work," Phillip said.

"I like the work I do. It's really great.

"I like seeing the people I know and talking to them. I've worked here for 10 years so have worked with the same people for a long time."

"I also like talking to the supervisors."

One of Phillip's supervisors is Shirley Beattie.

Shirley helps oversee the 20 employees in Kurrajong's electronic recycling team (around 10 employees typically work on any given day).

"Phillip is a very charming gentleman," she said.

"He's always got quite a happy disposition and it's good to have a little bit of a joke with Phil. He's always telling me what shows are on the television.

"Before I came to work for Kurrajong I was in a totally different field. To work with the wide range of people that I work with here has been quite a blessing.

"Every person who works here has an intellectual disability and some have other disabilities. It brings its own challenges and rewards but every person is different and every day is very varied."

Kurrajong offers Phillip flexible hours where he can choose his own hours and days of work. Shirley is also able to support Phillip if he needs help to make or attend an appointment.

"Looking out for the health and wellbeing of our supported employees is something we do.

"Kurrajong is important because it provides people with disabilities the opportunity to work and to feel a sense of self-worth. The supported employees get self-satisfaction and they're also providing an important community service."

"It's a good place to work."







Kurrajong Recycling – Facts



As part of the National Television and Computer Recycling Scheme, established in 2011, Kurrajong Recycling recycles the electronic waste for a number of RAMROC and REROC councils



Contracted to product stewardship organisation MRI, Kurrajong supported employees dismantle electrical and electronic equipment such as computers, television, vacuums and microwaves



Kurrajong Recycling processes 450 tonnes of these particular materials each year



The recovery rate is 98%, a much higher rate of recovery than automated processes. The remaining 2% is mostly timber which cannot be recycled



Overall, Kurrajong Recycling processes 17,500 tonnes of materials each year



As well as providing kerbside recycling processing services to local councils, Kurrajong Recycling also offers a document destruction service (both electronic and paper documents) on a fee for service basis, commercial waste collections, rural properties domestic recycling and scrap metal recycling

Age no barrier to involvement

The students in our region are living proof that you're never too young to lend a hand.

It has been an incredibly rewarding year, with a number of schools and community groups encouraging or actively assisting their students/members to support Kurrajong.

This support is given in a number of ways and not only benefits Kurrajong and people with disability, it is also an important part of each student's development.

A number of schools have held fundraisers within their school community, raising substantial amounts of money to benefit our programs. The students are always genuinely delighted to learn what has been possible as a result of their efforts.

This year the students of Kildare Catholic College raised \$500 towards our Hildasid Community Farm project and Narrandera High School Year 12 students raised \$2,500 to purchase outdoor settings and other items for the new Kurrajong Supported Living units in Narrandera.

Others have organised students to support our fundraising initiatives through their school or community programs such as Duke of Edinburgh Award (The Riverina Anglican College), Lutheran School's Community Service Task Program or Kooringal High School's Leadership Program.

The Kurrajong Race Day enjoys the physical assistance of approximately 90 students from a range of schools

who provide hundreds of volunteer hours in preparation for race day and on the day itself.

Among the students we see a willingness to help without any expectations of reward or recognition. We let schools know when their students are involved in Kurrajong at a personal level, and it is always wonderful to hear when a school principal acknowledges a student's efforts on our behalf.

Seven ways you can help us make a difference!




